Saturday 1 Oct 2011


Went to Vanity crossing on Saturday for opening but was amazed to find 3 vehicles there all fishing in various parts of the river so I packed up and went to Cotter river near the dam. Water was discoloured. Slow running and smelly. Had a few casts saw a couple of carp. had a fly attacked by a bird and the heavens opened up so came home and sulked

Tuesday 4 Oct 2011

Fished Vanity crossing using a dry fly (Adams Parachute) and a bead head nymph, Not having any luck until I was about 300 metres upstream where I changed from the Adams to a Royal Wolff. Caught 4 rainbows in the space of about fifty meters ranging from 25cms (picture attached) to 31cms all taken on the Royal Wolff. Missed three others and found that there was no hook on my nymph which explained why I was getting hits but no fish. A member of Canberra Fly fishers named Mick caught up with me and as I had had a good successful morning I let him go through, while he fished the hole with bead head nymph where I had just dropped a nice rainbow, he had instant success catching two rainbows in the same hole.

1 / HOW TO READ LAKES

- -WHAT IS UNDER THE WATER IS BASICALLY THE SAME AS ABOVE
- -LOOK AROUND BEHIND & BESIDE YOU, *THERE ARE ROCKS/TREES/GULLIES/DROP OFFS*
- -NOW LOOK BACK INTO THE WATER, IF *THERE IS A GULLY RUNNING INTO THE LAKE, THIS CREATES A DROP OFF IN THE LAKE A NATURAL SHELTER AND AN AREA THAT FOOD WILL BE DELIVERED TO FISH*
- -TREES AND ROCKS ARE NATURAL HABITATS FOR FOOD AND SHELTER
- WIND IS YOUR BIGGEST ASSET WHEN LAKE FISHING
- THE WIND WILL BRING FISH TO YOUR FEET
- PRACTISE CASTING INTO OR 45 DEGREES ALONG A BANK THAT THE WIND IS BLOWING ONTO
- YOU WILL BE SURPRISED AT HOW MANY FISH YOU ACTUALLY SEE
- -FLAT GRASSY AREAS ARE BEST FISHED WITH SOME WIND AS THE FISH WILL SPOOK WITH NO COVER
- -BARREN ROCKY SHORES FISH WELL WHEN YABBIES ARE ABOUT, SPRING /SUMMER
- -PROMINENT POINTS ARE GOOD BECAUSE DEPENDING ON THE WIND FOOD IS BEING PUSHED ALONG OR AROUND
- -DROP OFFS ARE THE KEY TO CONTINUALLY CATCHING FISH/ COMBINE WITH A SOAK EXCELLENT

2/ HINTS ON WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- -DUCKS FEEDING IN AN AREA, THEY ARE THERE FOR A REASON, FEEDING, THE FISH WILL NOT BE FAR AWAY
- -LOOK FOR BIRDS FEEDING ON A BANK THAT THE WIND IS BLOWING ONTO, SOMETHING IS BEING WASHED UP
- SWALLOWS FEEDING OF THE TOP, SOMETHING IS HATCHING
- -LOOK FOR MOVEMENT IN THE SHALLOWS, STICK CADDIS OR TADPOLES
- -CONTINUALLY LOOK FOR SWIRLS OR SOME MOVEMENT, CHASING YABBIES
- -WIND LANES/SLICKS CLOSE TO SHORE OR ENTERING INTO A BAY

3/ HOW TO FISH

- -MOVEMENT IS THE MOST IMPORTANT KEY IF FISHING LARGE FLY'S
- SMALL FLIES SIZE 14 & 16 ARE THE BEST FISHED ULTRA SLOW

- -VARY YOUR MOVEMENT TO BE SUCCESSFUL, DON'T DO MORE OF THE SAME IF NOT WORKING
- -DON'T BE AFRAID TO STRIP OR MOVE DRYS QUICKLY
- -ESPECIALY MIDGE BALL IMITATIONS
- -DRIFT BUZZERS ON A LONG LEADER ON QUIET DAYS, WORKS WELL
- -ALWAYS FISH SHORT TO START WITH, COVER ALL WATER CLOSE THEN CAST LONG
- -LONG LEADER SET UP 16-25 FT FLOURO CARBON
- -WEIGHTED SMALL FIE'S ON A LONG FLURO CARBON LEADER
- WHEN SIGHT FISHING, TRIGGER A QUICK ATTACK OF YOUR FLY
 - ALWAYS FISH INSIDE A SIGHTED FISH OR MAKE IT TURN
