Zero bag limit now in place -Australian bass and estuary perch

Fishers are reminded a closure on taking Australian bass and estuary perch from all rivers and estuaries in NSW is now in place, for a four month period.

The zero bag limit does not apply to Australian bass and estuary perch caught in freshwater impoundments and dams, as they do not breed in these areas.

The zero bag limit closure for rivers and estuaries does permit catch and release of these species during the spawning closure. Any Australian bass or estuary perch caught must be immediately returned to the water with the least possible injury.



We first went to Sawyers Hut to avoid the crowds at Denison. Water was low but not ridiculously. Peter spotted one definite (followed his fly) and one shadow/bow-wave. I didn't see a thing.

Went to Denison after lunch and were dismayed to see multiple tents and caravans. 10 vehicles visible on drive in but then probably twice that number at the Glory Hole. Gave up in disgust.

We came home via Cochran's where Peter spotted a few rises. I saw one very irregular rise but inaccessible due to reeds. Went further downstream and spooked one (perhaps 40cm) as I climbed down a steep bank. No interest in my Wulff/nymph combo. Water pretty low but seems fairly clear.

lan's report from Burrum Heads

I am about 330km north of Brisbane at Burrum Heads Beachfront Tourist Park. Burrum Heads is a small town on the Burrum River and we can see the northern tip of Fraser Island on a clear day. My caravan is on a site next to my friends Neil and Joan.

Our typical fishing day sees us wheel Neil's tinnie down to the hand launching ramp, unclip the wheels and put them under the fig tree at the top of the ramp. We make our way through the sand bars to the yabby (pink nippers in NSW) bank, pump enough for at least a day and head up river to start fishing. There are local names for many of the mangrove islands and the passages between them. We tend to use yabbies most of the time rather than lures or fly. We fish sand flats, channels and creek mouths depending on tides and weather. We head back about lunchtime and there is usually someone on hand to bring our wheels down and help us pull the boat up the ramp. Neil cleans the boat and I clean the fish.

We usually make a coffee, do whatever chores are required and head for happy hour on the riverfront at about 4:30. There are often colourful sunsets (and stories) as we look west up the river past the moored boats. The dinner cooking is shared with Neil and Joan and this year also with other friends John and Christine.

Neil and I like to look for sand whiting but are happy to catch bream, flathead and other edible species. On our 5 outings so far we have also caught grunter, sicklefish, mud crab, garfish and assorted other things we'd rather not talk about such as stingrays, catfish, butterfly fish, leatherjacket, longtom and toads. In other years we've caught up to 28 different species over our 5-7 week stay.


We make Thai fish cakes with the standard recipe that is in most books but also add fresh ginger, lemongrass and Kaffir lime leaves to give some more complex flavours.

One of our favourites is whole bream baked in foil Thai style. We spray the foil with olive oil, place the fish and make several diagonal cuts in the flesh. We mix up various ingredients to place on top of the fish before wrapping it in the foil. I don't have particular quantities or ingredients, but we choose from crushed garlic, finely sliced red capsicum, lemon or lime juice, grated ginger, chopped chillies, coriander, fish sauce, sesame oil, spring onions or chives and white or rice wine vinegar. We cook on a barbecue or electric grill and a large bream may take up to 45 minutes. We put each parcel on a plate, unwrap the foil and place couscous around the fish to soak up the lovely juices.

The whiting and flathead are usually fried in peanut oil after coating with tempura batter or crumbs. We tend to use Panko crumbs as they have a nice crispness.

Just a report on my recent trip into the Eucumbene gorge. To start off a mate and I headed to Sawyers hut and took the 4WD track from there down to the Eucumbene River. We had heard of this "magical" pool within the gorge that was full of fish, so we thought we'd check it out for ourselves.



The strategy was to just walk straight there without fishing on the way, just so that we could get to the gorge quicker. It's about a 2km walk although it felt like about 6km!

The sun was out and it was an absolute cracker of a day!

The walk there was ok until we hit the start of the gorge, that's when things got exciting! I'm not sure if anyone has ventured into the gorge before, but it is often referred to as "tiger country"! They're not far wrong!

It was very steep rocky, bouldery, icy almost un- navigable (if that's even a word!) We were not deterred! We so badly wanted to see this pool, so we persevered and weaved our way in and out of the thick scrub, pulled ourselves and gear up and down boulders, constantly having to manoeuvre our rods in and out of the scrub. The area we covered was almost completely devoid of fish! We spotted only the one fish to which my mate hooked but subsequently dropped!


The fish certainly haven't made the run up to those upper reaches yet. We certainly need more rain before the fish will be able to make it to the gorge.

Many years ago CAA purchased the club boat with a Capital Equipment Grant to extend training to its members (in particular the juniors) in safe boat handling and maritime survival skills. Long term member of our club – Max Huntington – donated 2-stroke motor and trailer for it.

While it has served us well, it is now quite past its economic life causing much maintenance grief and troubles with repair parts availability.

We've taken the plunge and bought a new 4-stroke motor (of which more in a moment), however Jason M thought to take it out to expend the last of the 2-stroke fuel, do some training in accordance with our Burley Griffin licence, and possibly snare a fish.

CAA's New Outboard Motor

From Jason M:

While the purchase has been considered for some time, an urgent action was initiated when a 4-stroke came onto special at BCF Belconnen who advised that they had 1 left in its box, and the one on display.

The motor itself is similar to the comparable 2 stroke variants examined earlier in the year:

- It has an internal fuel tank, an external tank connection, as well as a fuel source switch.
- It has the standard shallow running bracket, with multiple heights. Although it is a short leg, it is the same length as our current motor, and we wouldn't want a longer one with the shallow spots we fish and the prop clears the hull well.
- Access inside is easy, such as for to top up the oil, and it is assembled quite cleanly under the cowling.
- As you would expect on a 5Hp, it doesn't look like it generates any charging power, but we believe this is typical others with the internal tanks for a motor of this horsepower
- Like the other outboards, it has a 2 year warranty.
- Like the 2 strokes, when using the internal tank the outboard can rotate 360° for easy maneuvering in tight spots without having to jump between forward and reverse.

Cost was \$899, a saving of \$500 from their RRP, bringing it down to the prices of 5hp 2-strokes being offered around town. The benefit of 4-stroke was seen to be that not only would it give us a quieter outboard, it could also boost the resale value if we decide to dispose of the boat in a couple of years. Weight is still about 25kg, so easy enough to remove for Googong etc

Dear all, would you please circulate this email as widely as possible?

31 tagged carp have been released into the upper Murrumbidgee River at Scottsdale (near Bredbo) and Murrells Crossing (downstream of Cooma). The tagged carp are marked with a long yellow tag near their dorsal fin (see below). These carp are implanted with electronic tags so their movements can be tracked to tell us how carp move up and down the river system.

We are asking recreational fishers to please RELEASE tagged fish if caught and report details to Bush Heritage Australia (mob: 0407 700 431). A reward will be given for making a report. Please take photos if possible.

Carp movement is being studied as part of the Upper Murrumbidgee Demonstration Reach Carp Research project in partnership with Bush Heritage Australia, NSW DPI (Fisheries) and the NSW Recreational Fishing Trust. 

The below document relates to the Thredbo River Track. Attached you will find some issues that I have identified as important to the hatchery if the bridge crossing is built there. These are my personal thoughts so if you have alternate views or do not agree let me know. I would like to put together a MAS response based on how members feel. The issue is not with the track or the crossing but we need to be mindful of any impact it will have on the hatchery operations. I think we need to ensure the hatchery staff are employed to grow fish, not run a tourist facility.

I look forward to your comments.

Lower Thredbo Valley Track - Fishing Stakeholders Continued...

From Steve Samuels to Cameron Westaway (NSW Department of Fisheries Inland Manager)

Some issues I would like to see covered off in negotiations on the track.

As you know I prefer that the bridge crossing be located at Paddys Corner, rather than the hatchery. It is my personal preference and this in no way reflects the view of the MAS as some members would prefer the hatchery location, with additional facilities. Having said that, if the hatchery is to be the preferred location then a number of matters relating to the hatchery need to be resolved. I list them below.

1. Buy, rent or free

The hatchery land is a valuable asset. Is it the intention for the Department to give the land freely to the project? I believe there is a strong case for the land to be sold to the project for the following reasons.

• The hatchery land to be used would consist of the abutment for the bridge, a walkway from the carpark to the bridge, the toilet block, the parking area and possibly the BBQ area. Sale of this land could be used to up-grade the hatchery. As it stands the hatchery's infrastructure is showing its age. If the sale could be accomplished the money would probably be enough to bring the hatchery up to a standard that would see it operate well into the future and be able to cope with new initiatives such as growing larger fish for stocking. If the land could be leased then the income from the lease could also be used for the hatchery, but this would not be as immediate but the hatchery may be able to secure a loan based on the rental income. Giving the land away to the project does not directly benefit the hatchery.

2. Parking

The parking area as it stands will probably not accommodate vehicles using the track and hatchery visitation. Additional traffic using the parking area will mean more maintenance.

• The current parking area is quite small. Sale of the parking area removes responsibility from the hatchery for maintenance. Sale funds could see a dedicated car park for the hatchery built elsewhere. If a sale cannot be achieved then an agreement needs to be reached on a contribution to maintenance for the car park as it stands. A full carpark on a Saturday will be a turn off for bus tours to the hatchery.

3. Toilet block

• The toilet block is very old and has a very limited capacity. With increased usage of the adjacent car park it is reasonable to conclude that the toilet block as it is will not be able to cope with the increased usage. Sale of the block will result in the proponents of the track taking responsibility for its up-grade and maintenance. Without a sale an agreement needs to be reached on the upgrade and maintenance of the toilet block and daily cleaning of the toilets. With increased usage this responsibility should not fall to the hatchery staff.

4. Flooding

• The area nominated for the bridge crossing is subject to flooding. The bridge abutments may contribute to additional scouring of the bank and collection of debris. Sale of the land will remove the responsibility of repairing scoured areas and removing debris collected by the bridge. Currently the hatchery staff are required to fill in a number of scour holes that appear after flooding and remove debris after flooding. Without a sale an agreement needs to be reached on repair of the grounds after flooding and debris removal from the bridge and pathway.

5. Hatchery Security

• The area from the car park to the bridge is open space. Access to the hatchery grounds is not restricted. With the increased traffic through the area the hatchery grounds should be secured by a suitable fence to prevent access to the hatchery. The current low usage rate has seen this aspect ignored, but with increased traffic it needs to be addressed. Sale of the land could be contingent on a suitable fence being erected by the proponents of the project.

6. BBQ Area

• The BBQ area could be included or removed from the sale. If removed an agreement needs to be reached on maintenance, servicing and cleaning if the public access is to continue. With increased traffic the BBQ is likely to see more usage and it should not fall to hatchery staff to manage this increased usage.

7. Rubbish

• If rubbish facilities are to be provided it should not fall to hatchery staff to maintain them. Additional rubbish is likely and agreement needs to be reached on ensuring rubbish does not contaminate the river or environs.

8. General Hatchery Operations

• There are a number of general hatchery operational issues that need to be addressed if the bridge is to be located here. The two most immediate and important are disposal of fish and predator removal. These issues will need to be addressed due to increased public traffic and a higher potential for interaction with hatchery operations.

9. Hatchery Benefit

• There is a general perception that the track will provide additional business opportunities for the hatchery. On the surface this appears a possibility, however some form of cost benefit analysis needs to be done to see if the perception is valid. If an additional facility such as a café was to be installed the issues of who builds it, leasing arrangements, staffing etc. need to be addressed if the land is not sold to the proponents of the project. If no additional tourist facilities are to be contemplated then what identifiable benefit to the hatchery is likely based on a business case analysis. Thousands of people may use the track annually, but those people are only likely to visit the hatchery once if at all.

I look forward to discussing these issues in future negotiations.

Bead: Copper 7/64

Tail: Coq De Leon Rib: Gold Ultra Wire

Thorax: Pink UV Ice Dubbing

Optional Lead wire underbody 0.15



Tip submitted by lan:

When casting a nymph across or upstream, don't be afraid to let it drift all the way downstream below you (if necessary giving it a mend or two). Regardless, if the rig has drifted downstream while you have been focusing on your next target upstream, always take care to do a couple of gentle strips before preparing for your next cast - so often the rising nymphs trigger a strike
