Saltwater Outing Report – 4-6 Mar

The following was received from organiser Jason M. Still awaiting advice from Ray A on how he and the family went.

A Tale of Two Tinnies

It was a dark and not so stormy night, and it was off to the annual CAA coastal outing. After some limited success at Tuross the last few years, and competing with another annual fishing comp for accommodation and fishing spots, we tried out Burrill Lake this year. Home base was the Big4 caravan parks, and luckily we booked around October as it was quite full there. Despite this and the flocks of hobies leaving the foreshore on Saturday morning, it was reasonably easy access and fishing spots.

With many of the regulars arriving late in the weekend, poor Bill was trying to find a social buddy in the other cabin as both of them were solo until the remaining gaggle arrived. Fortunately the roadworks down the Clyde weren't too bad, so by 11pm all the boats had arrived and apart from some bread and butter fishing on the jetty, Saturday was shaping up as the primary fishing day.

Two tinnies, one Triton

So, it was at dawn to launch the club boat and prep it for the first team of Kevin and Bill. In typical club sprit, we launched the two tinnies (club boat, & Jason M's) and Ray A's boat.

After some circular navigation issues in the club boat, they were off tossing soft plastics, with Bill going minimalistic on his tackle (after visiting the tackle shop in Bateman's Bay on the way). They made good use of the light weather to drift fish, working the depths (1-7m was the typical depth of the lake with mostly sand and weed but some rocks).

Meanwhile, Jason M reminded all why we got a new club outboard but after an hour pull starting the ex-club outboard and getting fuel back where it should be after bouncing the outboard about 2000km since using it in January, there was just enough time to wet a line and some crab dillies before returning for lunch and the other fishers. The club UHFs were full of fish reports as Kevin/Bill, Jason M, and Ray A/Grayson A explored the fishing grounds as the tide came and went.

After failing to convince his juniors that fishing was better than the pool, Jason M did a quick troll and landed a couple of nice pan sized aussie salmon on bibbed lures before locating Ray C and trying some bait and lure fishing. Meanwhile Bill and Kevin had been doing well, and by mid afternoon Tea was called after some floundering around and it is rumoured a nice breeder flathead decided Bill's thumb looked tasty...after it was seduced by a stickbait and checking the size of the landing net. Other species landed included squire snapper, sand whiting, and bream. Ray and Jason M did one last check of the dillies, replenished some baits with salmon heads, and returned to clean the fish. Lyall C arrived at dusk and practiced some fly casting to relax after the drive and international commitments earlier that day, before we mulled over the problems of the fishing grounds of the world and enjoyed some nice cheese and crackers.

Sunday an early checkout threatened the fishing until a dawn pot check revealed a nearby public ramp, enabling the tinnies to fish the rest of the day (and returning with a tasty 10cm blue swimmer). Lyall C ventured to the coat/estuary, and Kevin followed. Bill B landed some more flathead in the estuary before joining Ray C for some fishing from the club tinnie. Jason M convinced Luke M to come and partake in some fishing, especially after using Luke's Ben10 combo Jason landed a tailor when trolling at dawn with a bibles rattler.

With the trolling pretty quiet, Jason anchored up in a nice dropoff below the sand flats to get Luke onto his first ever fish. Failing to raise even a carp in LBG, this spot for piscatorial toddlers the day before seemed ideal for breaking the drought using some prawns (see comment below on bait dispenser). After a few false starts (and Dad in trouble for catching a 27cm whiting on Dad's rod), the hook was set and a 17.5cm bream landed. After a little convincing it was too small to keep, it was released back. Eventually four more were landed, up to 20cm, with as much fun had releasing them with the landing net after a quick pat. Rigs used were a 10-12lb red mono with a running ball sinker and #2 circle hook for Dad, #2 bean to a swivel and 30cm leader with red tubing and bead to simulate a bloodworm and a tru turn hook for Luke. Interestingly, a sandworm case came back up on the tru turn hook at one stage. Thanks to Bill for the family photography.

By 1pm the sun was out and roadworks beckoned, so we returned to the public ramp to recover the boats – at least until insistence from the kids for "just one more fishing" for a quick troll and boat ride and the promise to return another day for more fishing.

<u>Burrill Lake</u>. Despite having many users including Lake Burley Griffin scouts for sailing and canoeing, and a few other ski boaters and jetskis, there was still plenty of clear water for fishing. The boats made it great to follow the tides and locate the fish. The lake was popular with kayak fishers too. But even for those land locked, as Bill proved, there was good fishing in the channel although reportedly at night it was quite busy there.

There was plenty of fish life, even in the shallows with bream, whiting, garfish and tailor all spotted in the shallows. There are also plenty of cockles in the shallows, which made barefoot wading a trifle uncomfortable. Every now and then 2-3 sea eagles would appear, chasing a feed. What was thought to be a big bumble bee buzzing around the boats turned out to be a quadcopter – perhaps we'll end up on tv somewhere.

<u>The Results</u>. Some mixed bags were scored in, from Luke's 20cm bream for the juniors, to a 10cm top and bottom (17cm across the shell) blue swimmer, 25cm flounder, 27cmwhiting, 30+cm flathead, and Bill's mother-lode 80cm flathead. In comparison to recent years, the catch was better and hopefully not just a reflection of the skills attending the outing.




Lyall and Nathan Attend Brian Henderson's Spey Casting Lessons at Forster

Spey Casting in Salt Water??? by Lyall

Yes, it was a weekend in casting heaven up at Forster with the only master casting instructor and two handed casting instructor in the southern hemisphere Brian Henderson and his wife Anne. Nathan and I jumped into the car for the six hour drive north and conversations always ended with the statement "straight line path of the rod tip!!!!" It was like putting two pigeon fanciers together and all they talk about is pigeons.



Day one was casting theory and practice with the single Spey cast, double Spey cast, snake roll cast and more. On day two we did more grass casting then down to the salt water lake to put our practice into practice.

OK, so Nathan caught two mullet on the fly and I only caught one in our twenty minutes of fishing, but I don't feel bad ... much. Note the length of the Spey rods in the background – 13 or 14 feet - massive !!!

While we aren't a member club, CAA members will recall that there is an ongoing discussion between MAS, Fisheries, National Parks and Snow Mountains Authority about inappropriate vehicle access to the riverside near Denison

camping area. On 30 Mar, MAS organised a meeting of the key stakeholders to discuss the access issue. While there were positive vibes we have a way to go before concrete outcomes can be expected. Steve Samuels is preparing a press release however it has not yet been received. It will appear on our blog as soon as it arrives.







NSW Council of Freshwater Anglers News

March issue arrived just too late for March *Burley Line*. It is available <u>here</u>. CFA are also offering up an <u>archive</u> (I've added this to our Useful Links page on our website).

The <u>April issue</u> has arrived. Key news is that MAS President (and major player locally) Steve Samuels has been appointed to the new Recreational Fishing NSW Advisory Council, a key advisory body to the NSW minister. We'll ask Steve to come and speak to the club about hot issues in the future. We're sure he'll be an excellent representative for Region 8 (which is mainly the Monaro and Central Tablelands area).

NSW RecFish News

Same with this one. March issue available <u>here</u>. Significant discussion on NSW introducing compulsory wearing of life jackets when rock fishing. RFA has concerns over the style and standards of jackets given the differing conditions experienced by rock anglers and the differences to boating. I think this issue is

essential reading for those rock hoppers amongst us. (There's also a number of other coastal items, for instance stocking of prawns into two waterways of NSW South Coast as well as removal of sand from Lavender Point Tuross Head boat ramp).

Fisheries Victoria News

Most recent issues, 385, 386 and 387, have been published. (The best Internet resource is probably the <u>Victoria Fisheries Facebook page</u> where individual topics are posted up separately.) Three items jump out as particularly interesting to us (well, me):

A video on Victoria's Snob's Creek Trout Hatchery (click <u>here</u>). Of particular interest is the size of fish that Victoria stocks with. It's a very professional video showing a very professional fish raising and stocking process. Victorian Fisheries have a very Gucci smartphone app with regulations, species identification and lots more. Click <u>here</u> to go to the explanation page. And finally:

Proposed changes to fishing licence fees

Recreational fishers are invited to have their say on proposed changes to our recreational fishing licensing system.

Every cent from licence fees goes back into projects to improve recreational fishing opportunities.

Under proposed changes, the price of recreational fishing licences will increase from July 1 this year and extra revenue generated will be spent on boosting recreational fishing.

Licence fees have not increased since 2008, and since 1999 the price of a one-year licence has only increased from \$20 to \$24.50.

Under the proposed changes:







- the 2-day licence would be replaced by a 3 day one and rise from \$6 to \$10
- the 28-day licence would rise from \$12 to \$20
- in line with NSW the 1-year licence rises from \$24.50 to \$35
- the 3-year licence would rise from \$66 to \$95.

If purchased online, the 1 and 3 year licences will be discounted to \$33 and \$90 respectively and anglers will receive a plastic licence in the mail.

There will be no changes to exemptions and children under 18 will continue to fish for free.

A five week public consultation period began on Wednesday 16 March. Find out more at www.vic.gov.au/RFLchanges. Submissions close on 19 April, 2016.
