
weekend.



Tumut River Long Weekend

Trip Report—Provided by Luke

After not being able to make the CAA Tumut Outing, it was decided that Nathan, Evan, Mark and myself would take advantage of the ACT long weekend and head down to fish the Tumut river ourselves for the day and try our luck.

After a quick stop for breakfast and coffee, we geared up and hit the water to find the flow running much higher than anticipated. A check found it to be around 1500ML/day, while not un-fishable, it certainly made access and crossing more difficult.

With the 4 of us on the river, it didn't take long for us to cover a substantial amount of water. I was lucky enough to land 1 small rainbow right where we parked, and another 4 further upstream. While Nathan managed to get 2 fish to the net.



It was decided to move to another stretch of the river, to only find a couple of other anglers on the water, so we had to drive to another area with public access.

Mark managed to pick up a rainbow upstream, while Evan came into his own by landing 2 well conditioned fish on his 12ft Tenkara rod. I was lucky enough to land another rainbow at the car but ended up slipping over and soaking myself head to toe in the process.

After a break for lunch (and time to dry myself off) we headed back to the stretch of river we first fished in the morning.

Splitting off into pairs, Nathan and I headed upstream and managed to find a suitable place to cross the river where we were able to fish some slower flowing water.

We were both rewarded with Nathan landing 2 more fish and dropping a few more. While I was lucky enough to land 3 more fish including my best for the day which measured 43cm.



It wasn't too long until we were radioed by Mark and Evan to let us know they had landed a couple of more rainbows and that they were heading back to the car.

Nathan and I decided to call it a day and head back as well. Shortly after this, Nathan took a page out of my book and managed to gracefully take a spill in the river on the way out. Not to miss out on the action, I somehow managed to get my net caught on the electric fence on the walk out and was 'shocked' to find it was active.



With over a dozen fish landed between the 4 of us, we decided to end the day with a couple of beers at the Tumut River Brewing Co. A highly recommended stop if you're in the area.

Lyall, Stefan and Bill attended the workshop to represent CAA.

Trout Strategy Workshop

Readers may recall an earlier attempt by Fisheries to consult with anglers on trout management when a public meeting was held in May 2014 in Cooma. This was reported upon by our own <u>Dr Bryan Pratt in the Sydney Morning Herald</u>, as well as words from Peter Gibson (NSW CFA) in our <u>Jul 2014 Burley Line</u> (rather appropriate that the 2014 Tumut trip was reported on in that issue).

Compared to the haphazard Cooma meeting, the 2018 Trout Strategy Meeting was professionally adjudicated by Rural Woman of the Year and Australia Day Council member Ms Robbie Sefton. The purpose of the meetings held in Armidale, Bathurst and Jindabyne was to seek community input on the range of issues affecting the recreational trout fishery and to identify options designed to support high quality trout fisheries and positive angling experiences.

The workshop was much better conducted than the Cooma meeting. The perhaps 70 attendees generally provided constructive contribution though there was a palpable feeling of disappointment that many of the promises made in Cooma had not eventuated. That said, while this was touted as a workshop, I was concerned that much of our time was spent being spoken to rather listened to. Much of the final "question time", where unstructured contributions could be made, came after the advertised finish time and a significant number of people had left.

The audience was dominated by older men. Is that a true reflection of trout anglers or a result of the meeting being scheduled during working week? A number of CAA members had commented to me that taking time off from work was not feasible. The audience was asked how long they had been trout fishing – more than 80% over 20 years – and how often they fish – more than 40% greater than once per week – indications of a particular demographic. Not captured was whether the audience was dominated by fly anglers.

General acceptance was there that science and credible observations must inform management decisions. The newly appointed Fisheries Research leadership and staff gave me some confidence that this will be so – though with the caution that funds are limited. Even key Fisheries manager Cameron Westaway looked to be on board but you can hear his underlying reticence to add to regulatory complexity if our different ecological zones called for different fishing rules. More worrying is that it seems some 'marginal' trout waters are already being accepted as being lost, being targeted for native fish stocking and to be classified General Inland Waters in respect to fishing seasons – in advance of scientific analysis and the Trout Strategy.

Overall one concern I came away with is that the idea of improving the effectiveness of stocking was pursued much more than enhancing natural recruitment.

I submitted on behalf of Queanbeyan Angling Club a written submission to Fisheries and the facilitator. I'm unsure if anyone else did similar. The submission aligned with much of the audience contribution and the statements from Fisheries:

- · improving survivability of released especially spawning fish
- improving our social licence including by enhanced participation by the public
- increased effectiveness of trout stocking as well as natural reproduction
- management being informed by science


Trip Report—Provided by Bill

lan had been holed up in Gore pretty much house bound for the two weeks prior to Lyall and I arriving in Queenstown. We were heading again to our old stomping grounds on the Mataura but the river wasn't playing its part. The water stayed up and dirty pretty much for the first week – as I later explain to my wife "that's why I have to go for two weeks" – more dark looks follow.

All three of us managed to get out on the first Monday for a fish somewhat upstream in the Mataura with our favourite guide Barry Perkins of Fly Fish Mataura (hmm, I used to appear on Barry's promotional flyers but now Lyall pops up on the website ... whatever happened to loyalty to long term customers like Peter and me. Has it got anything to do with a certain CAA member having a 22 fish day in January!). Barry is pretty good at working out what the local trout are looking for and fish were caught even with the drastic conditions.




As you can see, the situation in respect to water levels was quite nasty for the first half of our trip. Not apparent from just the water levels was how dirty the water was until the end of the first week. Suffice to say that Lyall and I even broke out our switch rods and gave the swing a go – unfortunately no success except in locating a very homey pub in Riversdale to while-a-way a few hours.

The 'gotta go for two weeks' strategy paid off. On the second Monday, Barry took us to one of his favourite rivers, which will remain nameless. All three of us got into the fish – though stepping onto them in 10cm of water is not recommended as an approach.








In amongst all this, we were starting to see clearer water and fish rising. Much email debate was had on the relative value of a nymph caught fish versus a sighted fish caught on dry. (A topic for further discussion in the bar).

Suffice to say that our last day was a pearler with fish rising from around lunch time till dusk with a number brought to the net – as you can see next...

Record 6 Million Fish Stocking

It's a new record! More than 6 million fish have been stocked into over 200 Victorian waters during the last 12 months.

Increasing fish stocking is a key commitment for our Target One Million plan. The commitment was 5 million fish, but we've surpassed that number by more than a million thanks to funding from your fishing licence fees and Target One Million.

Opera House Nets Banned

Attention yabby fishers! We're phasing out opera house nets and will be replacing them with 'wildlife-friendly' open-top lift nets by 1 July next year.

Up until now, many fishers purchased opera house nets to target yabbies unaware they couldn't be used in public waters in Victoria. Open top lift nets can be used in both public and private waters and are proven to be effective yabby catchers.

As part of the changes, a one-for-one trade-in is planned, whereby fishers can trade in their old opera house nets for free open top lift nets.

Fishing Returns to Dartmouth Pondage

A section of the Dartmouth Pondage in northeast Victoria has reopened to fishing for the first time since 2013.

The new arrangements will be officially launched at Dartmouth today and, in a boost for local and visiting anglers, the Pondage has been stocked with 20,000 trout to accelerate the fishery's development. When open to fishing previously, the pondage was known to grow trophy trout to three kilograms and often boasted the winning fish in local angling competitions.

The re-opening project was funded by the Andrews Labor Government's Target One Million plan, which is investing a record \$46 million to get more people fishing, more often.
