

# From the Fires to a Flood – Southland Feb 2020

The following report will only give you a short taster. If you want to get the full story, you'll need to come to the talk – tentatively scheduled for the April meeting.

The original plan was for Bill, Peter, Claude and Jason Q to travel to Gore, Southland NZ for two weeks of mind-blowing fishing – in the end it was not quite as planned. Firstly, Jason decided to move to Cairns, bringing our crew down to 3, then mother nature decided to play as well. On 28 Jan, Peter and Bill left with some trepidation due to the fires approaching Tuggeranong – little were we to know that we would be jumping from the fires into a momentous flood. By the time Claude arrived on 4 Feb, it was getting beyond a joke.



As usual, the first day was travel down to Gore with our first day fishing on Sun 2 Feb. Peter landed three modest fish on nymph in the run opposite the farm. Bill's efforts with the dry to fish rising in the swirl pool were characterised by disdain from the fish and spooking the ones that could be reached easily. The afternoon at Gibson Road was better for him with a matching threesome: one smaller on nymph (photo) and two in the reliable foam lines on dry.




The rain was heavier on Mon 3, so we decided to have a quick look at the Waipahl where Lyall and Bill had fished a pretty little farm stream in 2018 (below).



We started to get the impression that this rain event might be a bit serious:




The whole nature of this trip was then dominated by the incredible floods of the Mataura. No-one we spoke to had ever experienced anything like this. The overall consequence is that we had to travel extensively, even moving locations, to get to good water.



To put the graph above into perspective, the river was only just becoming fishable in the last two days of this trip – water still high and unfortunately dirty, though some fish were responding. We have always argued that

you have to plan on visiting NZ for two weeks to cater for bad weather, you can see why. Again, to put the graph above into context, compare with what we thought was a mammoth flood we struck in 2011.



Tue 4 Feb and we had to get up to Queenstown to pick up Claude. Our normal route into Gore along River Rd was blocked by flood waters. 2PM and the river was getting right out of hand. A decision was made to leave and stick to the State Highways. Our route would take us up the East Coast to Milton, then across the South Island to Alexandra thence into Queenstown – 4 and a half hours compared with the normal route of

about 2 hours. Claude was duly collected and we dined in Queenstown. The return route fared well until we had a very confusing redirection across the Clutha near Roxburgh. This took us through a town called Miller's Flat, of which we got to see many more times over the coming days.

The flood was uprooting trees on the bank as well as more substantial objects as we discovered much later. Shipping container looking much worse for wear.



We came to the inevitable conclusion that the Mataura and nearby streams were not going to be fishable and we'd have to go further afield. Two hours' drive up through the previously mentioned Miller's Flat saw us at Lake Onslow, but Peter and Bill recommended fishing the Teviot River immediately below the dam. This is mountain goat country, but delivered us some good fish, mainly on wets.

Sun 9<sup>th</sup> had us travelling a long drive up through Alexandra and Omarama to 3 nights in Kurow – very pleasant house right in town, very close to Peter's favourite river the Hakataramea. A quick change and we were on the water low down in the system. Peter and Claude spooked a number of large trout in very shallow water … we've gone from severe floods to severe drought! Bill was content with one miss on a dry fly but focussed on one 'fascination pool' where the fish were staying on station and feeding with gusto both visually and audibly. Shame the wind was creating havoc with placing the fly.

Mon 10<sup>th</sup> and we headed right up to the top of the system. Two locals were fishing the very pool that Bill got his 'big one' in Nov 2017. Elsewhere the water extremely low and the deep gutters on outside bends were not revealing any fish. Bill had no sightings upstream till he got as far as he wanted to walk. A number of fish were sighted there but spooked, or couldn't be tempted. Morale just a trifle low.

Meanwhile the other two were getting into fish or at least sighting and getting them on the hook.





A return for the evening rise had no success for landing fish. An error trying to free a fly had Bill break his

rod. Thankfully Claude could offer a spare rod till we could get back to Gore.

Tue 11<sup>th</sup> and our last day on the Haka. Off to the middle section near Cattle Creek. Working both down and upstream was not an option due to 'stay out signs' and we headed up the river concerned about the depth.

Claude broke the ice casting deep nymphs into fish sighted deep in a gutter (who had ignored multiple dries).



Peter enticed a rise with a dry before Claude continued to fool the deep fish with his nymphs – Bill was in despair.

Walking to go back home, Bill spotted a fish high in the water seemingly looking for surface food. Two casts with the dry fly and a satisfying crunch had the 53cm trout taking the fly. Unfortunately a number of jumps in shallow water meant that even 15 minutes effort couldn't revive her satisfactorily. She ended up smoked for our nibblies back at Gore. At another level, we were disappointed – the only fish killed this trip.



On return to Gore, we found the rivers high and even searching higher tributaries failed to produce fish.

Fri 14 and we normally would be washing and drying. Claude and Bill gave Gibson Road one last go.

Claude actually landed a small redfin – we'd heard that English Perch were present in the Mataura but had never seen one. Bill spotted a rise in what was left of the swirl pool and landed a nice brown on dry on his last cast for the trip. A fitting end for him.



The afternoon saw Peter and Bill doing their scrub and dry whereas Claude managed two on nymph on the bank opposite the farm – the Mataura was coming back to life just as we had to leave.

# **Postcards From Tasmania – Part 2**

These finalise Jason's journey started last month.

#### JM's Tassie Postcards – #3 – W Tas (Rocky Cape NP)

With my kayak fixed up after a few war and tear issues at Brogo, I took it for a paddle into Rocky Cape National Park. Launching at Sister's Beach boatramp, my squid jig seemed snagged up, and after freeing it seeing a nice squid following it, a re-cast and catch occurred. It also christened a nice Savage Gear MPP2 3-4kg spin rod I got down hear in winter, for a bargain \$30 (\$15 after using a coupon) down from \$99. Stowing the squid, I headed out round the headland into the park area.

There are a number of bush walks between the boat ramp and the Cape, and I occasionally saw a few hikers from my kayak. Most of the inshore water was 7-8m, once I got my Elite 4 onto the right frequency my old Eagle transducer was on. I picked up a 31cm wrasse on an old bony bream soft plastic, but otherwise the trolling was quiet.

After a lunch top on the beach near the 5 Sisters, and changing rigs, I went to the next feature, Anniversary Point. There was a big sea eagle eyeing me off from the rocky point, and some fish on the bottom which I marked. There was a beautiful lagoon in behind the headland rocks, about 3m deep and great to bring the kids to for a snorkel (except lacking fish). Visibility from the kayak was about 10m deep in the nice clear water here, with good resolution at 5m of the bottom.

Putting some squid mantles on a whiting rig (like a snapper rig but smaller hooks and lighter line), I caught bunches of small wrasse, to around 25cm, but nothing of not on my marks. Trolling back with a deep diver, all was quiet except seeing one bait ball, about 2m in diameter, in 10-12m, but no predators spotted. With it getting late, and the wind building, I kept paddling.

Back near the boatramp, I went to where I had spotted boats often loitering, but no fish. I put the squid jig out again, and lost a couple and landed one.



I was putting it in the keeper net when another grabbed my dangling jig, catching the rod as it tipped in my lap. It turns out the locals call this the squid hole.

The locals usually find their flathead in 30-40m, with people catching flathead, school sharks, and gummy harks further out the other side of a nearby island or of Rocky Cape itself, so I was happy with two squid and a wrasse (quite tasty baked up for NYE). I also tried the Squidezy cleaning tool I saw advertised last year. They probably need a bit more practise, but certainly made skinning the squid much easier, even if I used a different was to skin it (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZMwDwON0pTA</u>).
