

Native Fish Stocking Proposal

Hi all, with discussions around the Dollar 4 Dollar stocking at the AGM I thought I'd put some more information in the newsletter as not everyone may know what we have been talking about.

ACT. National Capital Authority (NCA) each year (in Nov/Dec) stock many of our lakes in Canberra. The one I did two years go did Yerrabi Pond, Lake Ginninderra, Lak Burly Griffin, Tuggeranong Lake, and some small stocking at Isabella Plains and Bonython, and finished by midday including the politician & press show. In all from memory there were 57,000 fingerlings of murray cod, and NCA try to alternate annually between cod and yellowbelly.

NSW. NSW has both a stocking plan, and MAS supports this in many of our areas (and QAS) for trout, but for natives NSW has the Dollar 4 Dollar fish stocking grant (funded through license fees etc), to match proposed purchase of native fish from NSW hatcheries, which meet conditions to be awarded a stocking permit (eg environmental conditions). This means that \$1500 buys \$3000 worth of fish, and we get to shape where the fish go.



Canberra Anglers Association did some Dollar 4 Dollar stocking in areas of the Queanbeyan River December 2013, aligning to where some of our members as Capital Region Fishing Alliance (CRFA) help re-snag the river. Read about it in the Jan-Feb 14 *Burley Line*. **Supplier**. Looking back over the years, both NCA and CAA have used Murray Darling hatchery. Looking at fingerling price last year, they still showed best value if we were to proceed.

The concept. One option to get more fish for our money is to try and align delivery with NCA's Canberra fish. This saves delivery costs (they come from Wagga that morning), and NCA offered this up through the Lake User Group previously.

For stockings, we identified two locations last year (let's call them Santa and Claus). Santa was a northern location near Yass, Claus was our previously stocked location in Queanbeyan. With the drought last year though, we deferred our Dollar 4 Dollar grant, which from a club perspective was both fundraised by sale of the CAA tinnie and dispersed stocking funds from



CRFA when it disbanded.

How it's done. It's a pretty simple activity – the ute and trailer (with well conditioned tanks to ensure fingerling survival) are driven near the water, and then fish are scooped out and placed into a paintstyle bucket. This is then carried to the water, and then slowly mixed to avoid shocking the fingerlings. I haven't gone back to my notes from 2018, but we had somewhere between 500-1500 fingerlings per

bucket. So, helping the hatchery owner with the fish, we quickly put a few thousand into Yerrabi Pond from the road – the others were parked near the water.

The idea would we would collect our fish up near Yass from the ute on its way to Canberra (probably around 7-8am), stocking some up there at location Santa, before heading south and doing one down there to Claus, transporting the fish in an esky with two aerators. This could be a bit more of a photo opportunity and followed up with some social fishing. That will get the fish in the water before it is too hot, with a great chance of survival.

Anyway, that's some thoughts from my experience, if CAA proceeds, which might be discussed at the October meeting.

What's Been Happening Up North



Dear Editor and Members,

I thought I'd get my last report in before the trout season kicks off and then Bill has to start prioritising whose article goes in when!

Recently I competed in the North Queensland Flyfishers (NQFF) Hinchinbrook Challenge. The challenge is in its 23rd year and attracts people from all over the country and even some international fishers. It was lucky to be held this year noting the COVID situation around the world.

Anyway.. It's pretty much 50 odd anglers, 2x solid days trying to catch 7x target species, however 9 if you count a Permit or Golden Trevally which are huge point scorers but carry big risks based on their nature to be pretty hard to sight-hook and land!



I managed to get a ride as a 'deckie' with the President of the NQFF - Matt. Matt has fished the comp for a few years and had a very good boat set up which I was very grateful to get a ride in.



Day one of the comp and it was blowing around 20km/h at 0600hrs and was only planned to get stronger throughout the day. We headed towards the channel looking for gutters on the



outgoing tide. We managed to find a gutter that held one fish - a 65cm scoring Barramundi. It managed to score me second-biggest Barra for the comp, the biggest being 75cm by the guy (Bob) who managed to land himself 2nd place overall for the comp.

Matt ended up landing a flathead and a wolf herring - one a target species the other not, but both measured for the score sheet!

Along with my barra I landed a measurable grunter. A slow day but we learned a lot.

We headed back in some very uncomfortable weather and ate at the Lucinda Pub where they put on a BBQ feast and had a few rums with fellow fishers.

Day Two saw us launching early again and headed up the channel to look for anything with structure! The weather wasn't on our side and what fish had been found and pricked the day before was going to make things very tough.

We peppered snags, mangroves and anywhere we thought held a fish to no avail, it wasn't until we found a nice snag on the windward bank with the incoming tide ripping back in and along it.



We had boofs and all sorts of action going on, the most all weekend. Matt missed a very big barra roll on his fly, and I managed to price a Queenfish and larger Grunter. During our ventures we came through a small mangrove island and noticed a very large Barramundi sunning itself in the shallows. We both took turns to entice it, but it was my large flat wing I cast that stuffed everything! The fly landed right on its back and tickled it down the side of it. The fish was not keen and took off into the depths.. And after that, that was pretty much the day! Sore arms, ego, and sun and wind burnt!

On a positive note the wind was so strong there was not a mosquito or midgee (sandfly) in sight all weekend.

I learned a bucket load and eager to get into the mangroves local and try it.

Maybe next year around this time, you might like to come up and fish it too.

Finishing up on Baitcaster Reel Maintenance

Last *Burley Line* Jason provided some notes describing his efforts of renovating an old baitcaster reel ... I thought the article seemed to end abruptly in a cliff-hanger. Little was I to know that a second part was in the mill. The full article is in our gear section, snippets below.


Following on from my Tackling the Trouble, I thought I would spool up the second part.

Previously, we gave the reel a bit of disassembly and clean with oil. The corrosion was still pretty persistent, so it as time for a bit more elbow grease.


First was soaking it in some warm soapy water, or a bit of vinegar (not too strong). This helped dissolve the salt a bit.



This didn't remove all of it, but did get much of the thin layers off. You could use a stiff toothbrush, or similar.



Still some pitting, but not blue/green like it was, ready for a coat of oil



Cleaning the springs and mounts with the wire brush. The sparkly bits are were the corrosion occurred between the spring and bracket, so I used the wire brush the take this stainless steel back.

The drive mechanism can be disassembled from the cover plate to lube it up better, but for two reasons I avoided this. One was I wanted to give it a fish the next day, and the second was the handle was corroded onto the shaft. Instead, I put the silicon reel greased into the grease access holes and worked it into the gears, which quickly restored the moving parts that had dried up.

Be sure to avoid any grease or oil near the braking surfaces (one on the spool, one on the reel). Otherwise, you will lose braking power and may need to replace the brake pad

For the re-assembly, remember to lift the thumb bar up, slide the little plastic momentum brakes back to the centre, and consider lining up the line with the level wind – on all but the Black Max, the levelwind moves with the spool both bringing line in and letting it out out, so having the levelwind and fishing line moving together helps reduce stress on the levelwind (& line), but more importantly helps casting by reducing friction. With these steps, the spool should drop in, and the mechanism side (right side) should go in easily to let the three thumb screws be done up.



....and out

With the weather blowing up down at Eucumbene, I noticed a nice weather window here in Canberra on Saturday afternoon, and invited Bill out for a fish. I would like to say I was actively fishing, but may have been more helping him clear some weed and manoeuvre around some snags when my reel began letting line out.

Seeing the chalky bulk in the water my first thought was carp, and then the profile reminded me of a cod (my biggest ...and only cod, was 45cm in Yerrabi). Once closer in though, I realised it was a golden perch / yellowbelly, much paler than the ones I grew up catching in the river in Queensland, but not the deep chunky ones often in dams. It was solid though, nice and thick, and was pleased to both get it on the reel – and the Berkeley baitcaster rod – but also the first yellowbelly I have caught probably since just after leaving school and in my yellow-bellied boat.

After helping my gillie Billy with assembling the landing net, the rod giving a nice tension without working the hole too much in the fish's mouth, we then landed the fish for a couple of photos and measuring at 55cm on my Neptune minnow. Now that's Reely Good....for reel!

Long Term Program of Events Not Formally Part of CAA Events


