## **Building Your Own Fly Rod**

One of our newest members has written this piece (placed in <u>our 'Gear' blog</u>) that might inspire all of us. A small taste below:

#### **Tristan**

For me, the ultimate appeal of fly fishing was always the idea of hiking and fishing remote streams; so from the first time my old friend Aaron showed me the basics of casting I knew that I wanted a rod that was light enough for mountain streams and could pack down for ease of travel.

Knowing that I also love to build things, Aaron sent me a link to Swift Fly Fishing, a company that produces fly rod kits under the Epic brand name. They have a large range of both fibreglass and carbon rods; for my needs/wants, Aaron suggested their 476 'packlight' – a 4wt 7'6" fibreglass rod that breaks into 5 pieces. The 'studio built' finished Packlight retails at \$1209 AUD currently; the kit version is \$540.



The instruction booklet is thorough and leaves very little to chance. The kit comes with natural and black silk threads; the detail explains how, using natural silk thread and thinned rod finishing epoxy for the first coat, completely clear wraps can be achieved. I think this finish really complements the fibreglass blank. It is a fiddly process but not unfamiliar for anyone who ties flies; after the first couple of wraps I was surprised at how quickly I could finish one. Clear instructions are given on how to start and finish each wrap with the thread tag tucked under to hold everything in place until epoxy is applied.



Clear wraps under preliminary coat – final topcoat smooths out the visible dimples and rough patches.

I've now landed 4 trout – including my first ever on fly – using this rod on the Cotter (*Ed: well done BJ mentoring Tristan that day*). I absolutely love it, partially for the look, feel and performance, but there is also a huge sense of satisfaction in having built the rod myself.

## **Nymphs**





Peter and Bill have had a couple of trips down to Eucumbene. The first trip down we were hosted and mentored by a Eucumbene old hand. "midges are the go – retrieve really slowly if at all" – Bill had one hooked and lost due to aerobatics and later landed a 35cm (estimate) rainbow in very good condition ("I was pulling the line in real fast to 'cause I thought I'd tangled the fly and the fish took it at full speed" … "they'll do that some time"!). Peter got busted off by some underwater freight trains. As the sun went down the Easterly sprung up and, while there were desultory rises, the others were not interested in casting in the gloaming. We vowed to get down again real soon.

A week later our social calendar permitted another evening session. Forecast was for thunderstorms and Easterly to start at 6PM ... we ignored the bad signs and went down anyway. After Peter dropped one pretty much on his first cast, things got quite slow fishing midges until the sun set behind the hills. You can judge that Bill got a bit bored when he pulled out his drone and took some movies – here's one from above <a href="mailto:checking on Peter's casting">checking on Peter's casting</a>. The line is a little difficult to see, but silhouetted against the water was much better than against the sky.

Periodic frantic rising later resulted in a number of dropped fish for Peter but two crackers of rainbows landed. Bill managed to drop two fish (the last one was graciously rated as "pretty much the same size as mine Bill" ... way too smart for him with the fish rushing towards the bank and Bill unable to maintain pressure "perhaps barbed hooks has some merit (a)") Anyway he did land one reasonable fish who had put on quite a performance. The rises looked to be caddis inspired, but the ever reliable Parachute Adams did it for Bill, while Peter adopted the Grab'all

All in all, the best fishing we've had in Australia for some time.

## **MAS News**

Two key lobbying efforts by MAS recently. In due course they should appear on the MAS News page.

- NSW Lands Department is divesting its interest in many reserves around the state and passing them to local councils. In the case of Snowy Monaro Regional Council, this amounts to some 70 reserves. Some 24 are alongside and provide access to water, many of them trout waters. Since the lands are effectively freehold title to Council, there is a concern that they might be sold or leased out in a fashion that will deny angler access. MAS has made a submission to council to emphasise the importance of continued access to the general population and anglers. MAS has sought to discuss the matter with council.
- Crown roads have come up again. There is a crown road in East Jindabyne quite close to where we stay (in the CSIRO Ski Lodge) giving access to the water near Old Kosciusko Road. The landowner is seeking the crown road to be expunged. MAS has written an objection in order to retain vehicle access.

  of the King River as part of a trial supporting the Victorian Wild Trout Strategy.


