So I seem to be constantly talking to people about books I'm reading that relate to fly fishing, providing recommendations, and occasionally books to save time by avoiding (You don't need to read Izaak Walton for example - I did, and there only a few relevant paragraphs of interest in the whole book). Various folk thought there'd be interest, so I'm all set to do a brief review of books I'd recommend on a range of subjects, prose and literary writing (like this month), historical works, technical fishing books, fly tying, entomology, maybe even non fishing volumes about the places we fish. To start off, a few story based books from my library.

Ted Leeson. 2006, The Habit of Rivers

This book lives in my fishing truck, and fills in time when waiting for someone or something on the river. Many fly fishers try their hand at prose writing to varying degrees of success. Leeson sets the standard for the kind of imaginative writing that captures the ideas we all have but can't quite get the words out for. Highly recommended,

Norman Maclean, 1989 (and other editions), A River Runs Through It

'The book' on which 'the movie' was based. It's a good read, but don't expect it to be a meditation on fly fishing beyond it being the chief recreation of the father and brothers around which the tale revolves. It's still worth picking up, and well, nobody wants to admit they haven't read it right?

Phillip Weigall, 2009 & 2011, Fishing Season and Fishing Sense (Two Volumes)

Phil's prose style is pretty clear and straightforward, not remotely flowery. He still manages to capture the reasons why we fish, and the feelings that go along with it. The local content is appealing, and Phil peppers his stories with advice and technique that make me want to get the highlighter pens out. If you can find a copy of *Trout Stories* from 2004, it's also written in a similar vein.

Grahame Wicks, 1999, Trout Stream and Fly Rod.

The book follows a familiar pattern, a series of stories based on a series of fishing trips. It's no less interesting as a result though - the main selling point for us is that it's very local. Grahame fishes the Cotter, Point Hut, Angle Crossing, Frying Pan. The stories are from his very early fishing career in the 70s, so there's a nice local history aspect here as well. The book is a local pressing and might be a little hard to find. I'm happy to lend my copy if this is the case.

Thomas McGuane, 2001, The Longest Silence.

Another 'series of trips' book, but more philosophical than most. If you like Leeson's book, this is similar. Mostly US fishing with the odd international trip.

Barrington Tops

Bill

Via my membership of Queanbeyan Anglers Club I've been involved in MAS acquiring water temperature loggers (part of the DPI Trout Strategy research program). The loggers have not been deployed yet, but when an invitation came from a fellow NSWCFA committee member, Charles, to assist with deploying some loggers in the Barrington Tops for the local 'Barrington

Club' (a broad outdoor club with fishing a major aspect) I jumped at it. The following is my report.

Tue 9 Feb

We drive up via Gloucester.

We dropped into two sites where loggers have already been deployed ... nice camping opportunities on the Manning River and Dilbry River.

The Barrington Club have exclusive access to a number of privately stocked dams on a grazing property as well as accommodation.



The 'lodge' is a simple 3 room cabin.

I get to inspect the various dams as Charles monitors the flow between them. He is keen to get up to the upper dams. Steep climb and Charles takes pity on me and we don't climb to the final two – these were only stocked last year with fingerlings. Instead we focus on the lower (three) of these dams. Lowest dam and we spot a nice fish cruising and rising. Go on to top dam to find small rises only and not responding. Then go to middle dam, limited surface action but when my wet fly rests on surface for a moment a strong fish takes it. Was fishing one of Jason Q's wee wets. Eventually land an impressive 40cm rainbow hen.



As it happens the Barrington Club only stock female rainbows – perhaps to prevent local reproduction.

On my way down to the lower dam I spook a friendly wombat but then get too eager to get to the water. A big bow wave indicates I've now spooked a good sized fish. Charles lands a modest one.

Wed 10 Feb

Now for the real work placing the last two of Charles' loggers. Saxtby creek and Edwards Creek – tributaries of the Barrington River.

Above is a snippet from a logger placed earlier in the big dam near the cabin. You can see the diurnal variation and the general increase as the days got warmer in Jan (peaked at 26C on a very hot Australia Day). A bit disturbing as trout are reputed to be stressed at 25C - saving grace is this logger is quite shallow and there would be cooler conditions in the deeper water – a topic for discussion with the DPI researchers.

Some time for a quick fish and we spotted one trout each that followed but no bite so head back home.

Drone photo of the one of the upper dams ... this is a 'spherical' panorama looking straight down then up to just above horizontal and repeating this while turning around 360 degrees. If you rearrange the data so that straight down is one dot and 'just above horizontal' is the outer edge of

a circle you get the 'small planet' view below. I'm at 3 O'Clock and Charles at 1:30. The image is a bit disturbing since the surface of the water creates a mirror image of the surrounding trees.



Not a lot of sign of fish today ... just platypus.

Thu 11 Feb

Today we explore areas further afield on the Upper Manning River (sometimes called Gumi River since it passes through the Gumi Plains) – water gauge camp site quite a hairy drive down a rutted track.



Spot a mob of brumbies but no fish on. We saw only one (good sized?) fish rise when we first hit the river.



GPS tracks for the past two days exploring an extended area of this part of the world. Today ended on Pigna Barney River (slow and slimy) junction with Tomalla Creek (fast, clean but very small with trees to trouble my casting). No fish but I get to make up for this by landing a couple of trout at dusk on the top dam (small but sight fished on dry fly so they count for more).

Fri 12 Feb

After a brisk walk up the hill to look at the Hunter River headwaters, we head back to Newcastle checking out bass waters.

All in all an excellent few days and many thanks to Charles who did all the catering and cooking (I washed up). Good experience for when the loggers get deployed locally. Plus I've had a comprehensive exposure to a good part of the Tops.
