\$2 for \$1 Native Fish Stocking Program


This program is funded by our NSW licence fees. For every dollar CAA puts in, the Rec Trust fund comes up with \$2. We have about \$1,000 that came from the defunct CRFA for stocking, plus we have another \$1,000 identified in our reserves. Ryan and Bill are examining previous ideas from Lyall and Jason M for stocking the Yass River and Queanbeyan River with Murray Cod. Contact has been made with Yass Fishing Club to co-ordinate bids, plus with Queanbeyan Golf Club to access their side of the Queanbeyan River (near snags placed by CRFA) if we choose to stock there.

Gore New Zealand 2024 – a Little Different

Those who got to the February meeting got the full story, but here are the best bits.

One of life members, Stuart, introduced Ian, Peter and me to this amazing place. Since then, people like Lyall, Greg W, Jason M and Claude have sampled its delights. This year I was forced to go in late summer (I'd normally go there in late April) and was accompanied by Stuart, his first trip back in ages, a friend of Stuart's Steen, and a work colleague of mine from years ago and now resident of New Zealand, Alfred. It was basically the first fly trip that Alfred had been on, whereas Stuart and Steen were accomplished fly casters – albeit they've been focussed more on swoffing recently.



The cottage sits one paddock from the mighty Mataura River complete with the full gamut of large river structures.

The area had gone through a pretty hot summer with some small floods. When we arrived the river was slightly up and coloured. It seemed every time the river started to drop, we got a day of rain to top it up. Was windy many days too. Accordingly, we tended to fish smaller tribs plus the major Mataura trib called the Wakaia which seemed clearer.

Fishing was pretty hard without the usual success double nymphing in the main river. A couple

of days we struck rising fish with mixed results in fooling.

On a number of days we struck rising fish in the waters adjacent the cottage – check out this video of a very active fish at times less than a foot from the bank. No, I didn't manage to catch it.

My longest fish, but was a trifle lean and weighed less than a shorter one caught later.





My most successful days were on a small trib with sunny/windless conditions. This further cements me as a drv flv snob casting dries to sighted fish, what more can someone ask for? All my fish were between 52 to 57 cm and 3.75lb to 4.75 lb (measured). That said, I also spent so much time targeting a number of actively feeding fish, at times up to 30 minutes, without achieving a hookup.

At least this way I know the problem was me, rather than 'no fish'.

The others also caught fish. Stuart appears as our cover photo – this was the result of casting to a rising fish on the Mataura River near Riversdale. He tells me "My first landed fish. Hence the quizzical look on my face."

Steen on the Wakaia – he was most impressed that I directed him to the classic lie.

I concluded my talk by discussing what made this trip a bit different:

- Late summer versus autumn
- Hot dry summer with floods impact on insects?
- Only four duns and one spent spinner seen
- Almost none caught on nymph I lost my only one in fast water
- Sunny/windless days/small streams = dry fly heaven
- Were some of these trout focused on willow grubs
- Channels were much changed even from last April

Hmm, had a little incident on the Wakaia.

Nathan was good enough to glue on a new tip guide – maybe turning my 9' #7 into an 8'6" #7? I have since tried it out and managed a 60' cast! That'll do as an excellent spare rod in the truck I thought.

As it turns out, the incident was embarrassing on two counts – this is the fourth rod I've

broken, and the third Cabela's (the others were covered by warranty, but Cabela's didn't respond to my request for warranty on this one). Secondly, when I looked back at my old broken #6, I found the break was actually in the second section – I had a tip section available after all! Was a good thing that I looked as I've found a similar situation with my #3 so it seems I've now got a spare #3 tip.

And some of you wonder why I try to avoid nymphing, especially bead headed flies. Maybe I should just work on improving my casting.

Jindabyne Trip – 23-25 Feb

For some reason we had fewer members attend, the bonus was everyone (well except for the married couples) had a private room. So, Angie and Micheal, me and my wife Glenys, BJ, Owen, Geoff, Paul and his brother (newest CAA member) Pat assembled at the CSIRO Ski Lodge in East Jindabyne. We even momentarily saw Alan who staying in his usual abode of the caravan park to more easily hit the lake late at night. Paul and Pat had come down early and had some excellent results as you will see in their report. BJ came up with a great idea to dine at the Jindabyne Brewery – great food and excellent beer – almost like a Jindy version of Tumut River Brewing Company.

I've asked people to submit some photos and words. Geoff tells me he hooked 3 and landed one rainbow about 30 cm. For the moment, here is my report along with some photos from Owen, followed by Paul's:


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I partnered up with Owen fishing together Saturday and Sunday.



Saturday saw us walk up the hill from Dead Horse Gap to hit the upper Thredbo.

It had proven to be quite productive in the past, but perhaps due to the bright skies and gin clear water, we had no luck landing any fish. Owen came closer to that goal than me as at least he had one fish on.



Right up high, we came across a very long, slow pool. We counted 12 fish – most behaving in a very strange way swimming circuits at modest speed. Perhaps they were spooked by the presence of a cormorant. I had only one that took up a feeding stance at the junction of a little feeder stream. I managed a few casts that were ignored, until the fish moved, spotted my line and disappeared.



The walk home became quite exciting when Owen spotted a snake that I had just passed.



Sunday had us exploring the lower Wullwye Creek – this has come up as a possible way to continue having trout in the Dalgety reaches of the Snowy. The bankside reeds made access

difficult at Rockwell Road, so we headed down to Dalgety township. (Mark S subsequently told me we should have accessed via Dalgety Road where there are many fish.)








We managed a few great rainbows on the first day. Then we moved to a stream close to Jindy and got a few nice browns



These are in hiatus for the moment while they identify a new distribution system. Meanwhile they have a presence on all forms of <u>social media</u>.


Long Term Program of Events Not Formally Part of CAA Events
