eventually received his prize at the end of year BBQ.



CAA Carp Event – 12 Jan



Sunday's carp event was somewhat spoiled by the preceding days rain. After months without significant rain, the heavens opened with some good storms. BJ and I were really looking forward to some sight fishing on the Murrumbidgee and were very disappointed to see both the bidgee and Molonglo chocolate coloured from the top of Shepherds Lookout.

We surmised that the scarred earth around the new housing developments was the likely cause of the dirty water....supported by the fact that the water was relatively clear below Scrivener

Dam. We fly fished from below the dam (where the no fishing signs stopped) almost down to the

bridge that crosses the parkway without even seeing a fish.







We were constantly interrupted by Peter K's messages highlighting 'another fish caught' on corn in LBG. Both BJ and I did not catch any fish...but we had a pleasant walk...casting practice...and dealing with 'witty comments' from bystanders...'no trout in there mate'. Peter ruled the day (as far as I know) catching 9 carp on corn for the day ranging between 41 to 57cm...well done Peter!

Claude's Multiple Reports

Seems Claude has packed in some trips in the final days of his leave.

Claude and BJ tried to cram in all the planned holiday fishing in the last week of our leave. We had three trips, chasing natives in Lake Burley Griffin (LBG), trout in Lake Eucumbene and then the Carp for the club event. Our LBG trip was the first time we took out our 'SS Trout Bum' for 2025 and we launched from Black Mountain Peninsula and trolled close to the trees to the rowing lanes near Government House. We mixed our fishing between small/medium hardbodies to BJ's monster spinner baits. We saw a number of schools of small redfin trying to take on the larger lures equivalent to their size or larger. We both picked up a little reddy. BJ thinks he spotted two large Murray Cod as we drifted over the edges of some weed beds. On the return journey we moved slowly back along the tree lined bank next to the parkway. Casting into the bank, sunken/heavily leaning trees and into nearby water. We were using all the aforementioned gear, but I got lucky casting a black grub soft plastic into the shoreline under the trees. I initially thought I got lucky with a large yellow (not that I have caught many) but was amazed when I saw the distinctive colours of a Murray Cod...then I started to worry about my 5lb tippet and my 'light rod'. With trusty BJ's assistance the fish was netted and I could breathe a sigh of relief.....and

then I realised I would have to cast another 1000 times before my next cod ③.

A couple of days later we headed to Lake Eucumbene – Rushies Bay. We were very thankful for the low draft of 'SS Trout Bum' as we launched it into 6 inches (15 cm) of water and then walking it out for 20 meters before we felt we could safely get into it without bottoming. Rushies is a beautiful and scenic part of Euc and always looks very fishy. We didn't venture too far particularly with the wind and the electrical motor cutting out when we unknowingly knocked the battery connector. 10 seconds of panic each time. Lots of casting towards the rocks, shorelines and weed beds. I was fortunate to get four rainbows and one brown for the day. Most were caught in a #14 black woolly bugger and one on a #18 bibio wet fly.







Fishing for Trout in the Hot Weather

President of MAS, Kerry Pfeiffer, had prepared a substantial paper on catch and release for the NSW Rod Fishers Society newsletter – a particular point that came up in a recent conversation was the difficulty in successfully releasing fish when water conditions are poor. Given our recent hot weather and some Monaro streams stopping flow, the lessons here should be taken to heart. I'll put the full article into our '<u>Tips' section</u> in due course.

In the middle of summer when the water temperature rises above 22°C the available oxygen in the water makes a successful fish release harder. This may mean an extended time nursing the fish back from what would otherwise be curtain death. When you revive a trout, don't do it in warm backwaters or eddies off the main river. Revive it near riffles where the water is as cool and oxygenated as possible.

Releasing fish on pools with little flow during hot weather, such as occurs on the Monaro can be problematic. What flows there are can be well above comfortable temperatures for trout. In these situations, the coolest water will be in the depths of the pools resulting from temperature stratification, so attempt to release fish in the deepest water available.

Achieving good outcomes whilst undertaking a "catch and release" leaves a good feeling of perhaps seeing that fish again some day and again enjoying the experience. The release can be a tricky undertaking especially in warmer water, it is much harder to do without a net.



February Meetings - Christopher Cvitanovic Project Summary

I'm excited to let you know about a new research project that I am leading focused on understanding the human dimensions of fishing in Canberra's rivers.

This project seeks to gather essential baseline data on fishing behaviours and preferences in rivers in the ACT, providing valuable insights into fishers' knowledge of local rules and regulations, their methods of accessing information, and their perceptions about the interaction between trout and threatened native species.

By participating in this survey, you have a unique opportunity to voice your values and opinions, ensuring they are represented in the data. Your input will play a vital role in helping local managers strike a balance between protecting threatened species and maintaining a vibrant recreational fishery. The results will also help managers understand how to improve communication with fishers and the broader community using rivers in the ACT. This is your chance to contribute to the future of fishing in the ACT.

Our team will be attending your club meeting on 12th February, giving a short presentation about the work, and answering any questions you may have. At the end of the presentation, we will invite anyone willing to complete the survey, which will take around 15 minutes of your time. Any information you provide will be completely confidential and anonymous.


Other Stuff in my In-box


From Dave in QAC – this 40odd cm brown was coughed up by one cormorant. It was successfully revived and returned to the water.

Pat from QAC caught this good looking rainbow, but you can see the marks from a cormorant strike.







Peter K has been trying to teach me how to tell a brown trout from an Atlantic Salmon. My phone must have been listening as this popped up in my Facebook feed:


