Brindabella Trip – 11 – 13 Apr

Lachy

It was rather light on for CAA Club members attending this year. Thanks to Ryan for teeing it up, but unfortunately even Ryan was unable to attend. So it was left to Rod, BJ and Lachy to take advantage of the situation.

Things got off to a slow start with Rod getting a puncture on his way out,



necessitating a return to Canberra and what resulted in a new tyre – bit more of a costly weekend than anticipated. Even though it's not too far on from Piccadilly Circus, the dirt road on the NSW side of the boarder is littered with sharp rock, so it pays to deflate the tyres a bit.

Lachy arrived later than anticipated and consequently didn't hit the water until 1600. Fishing the front stretches of water near the huts, he managed to pick up 10 fish in just under an hour and a half. Yes Bill, they were all caught by euro nymphing! The fish were definitely on the smaller side ranging from fingerlings up to about 25 cm. The good news was that the fish were back and biting! Having been to the property in mid-March, the fish were definitely not as active in the warmer month of March.



Rod and BJ arrived a little later and no more fish were caught on Friday, although a selection of whiskies were put on the table and a wee dram or two enjoyed by all.

The rest of the weekend proved very fruitful, especially on the upstream reaches of the property. The water was very low and gin clear, but the good thing was that it was cool. So there were fish to be found, but not many rising. Most of the fish seemed to be holding in shallow riffles where the surface water was distorted. This certainly lent more towards nymphing, both indicator and euro, but the euro nymphing proved to be most effective. Lachy managed to get 20 fish in 3 hours on Saturday morning. These fish again ranged from fingerlings, tiddlers up to a maximum of about 28cm. Both browns, but predominantly rainbows. Rod and BJ also had success to varying degrees.

A spot of tragedy then struck on late on Saturday afternoon with Lachy hitting a snag and snapping the upper mid rod section of his favourite 10' 2wt nymph rod. Consolation was in the form of more drams of whiskey with property owners Pete and Fran joining in around the campfire. Pete and Fran were thrilled to hear of the uptick in fish being caught. It also was understandable for the majority of fish caught being on the smaller side given the impacts of the cormorant plague last year, but the success of stocking that was also done in 2024. Fran noted that only rainbows were stocked in 2024, so the smaller browns that were caught would have been naturally wild fish.

I think I touched 6 fish for the weekend and saw one 2ft-er + a couple of 1fters slip by in the deep, up in the gorge of the KNP border.

Euro Nymphing techniques were clearly most effective techniques in very shallow water in the



hands of a master- Lachy. It worked for me on a couple of fish. He even brought a guest (British Mil Attaché) down on Sunday (with permission) who also won a few decent catches.

Easter With Paul


Paul

(Editor: I have been advised that 10 inch ten pounders are little browns that act like they are 10 pounders).




The location and the solitude made for it. Magnificent. The walk out really tested us. What an amazing resource we have on our doorstep.









The Mighty Mataura in March



At the outset it was going to be a fly fishing and casting trip – at least for me. Changeable wind direction and changes in current made the Mataura in Southland New Zealand the perfect playground for single and double Speys, all the snap casts, simple rolls and snake roll casts – a cast for every occasion !!!

A Sage Trout Spey two handed rod was great for dealing with the wind and getting easy distance across the river presenting dries or nymphs. Fishing solo doesn't allow boasting photos so the "rod on rocks" version will have to do:



Being honest, some days were fishless and, nonetheless keeping up the casting, the focus turned to the fantastic location we had been given. Rising fish as darkness fell in one direction and a rising blood moon in the other ... and, yes, the rising fish ate the dry.



A day in the company of Barry Perkins of Fly Fish Mataura was an absolute ball. See International Fishing Guides at https://capitalflycasting.com/links As well as being a top guy, Barry provides second to none access and up to the minute knowledge about what is rising where. With Barry behind the shutter, this mirror pool yielded two chunky fish on dries contributing to a five fat fish day all caught single hand Spey style.

New Zealand with Some CAA Gurus

I won't bore you with too many photos firstly that impressive fish of past President Geoff's on the cover. It was measured at 25 inches and 18.5 inches girth. Based on the calculator at https://fiveriverstu.org/fishweight-calculator this would indicate 10.7lb. Certainly an impressive catch towards the end of the trip. Meanwhile here is life member Stuart with a nice one from a little stream. I got a few on the first day, and we all had one marvellous day on the Whitestone River with plenty of eager rainbows on dry but ... almost the entire fortnight was high winds/high and dirty water. We always argue the benefits of staying for a fortnight, but even with that extended period, we were forced to travel long distances to get to good water. I can only recall a handful of duns on the water very out of character for this time of year/this fishery.





This was our first experience of New Zealand's new voluntary beat system. They've invested a lot in it with comprehensive signs at access points. Parking your car here indicates that a beat is occupied though you can feel free to follow the earlier angler. The signs give a satellite view to show the extent of the beat. Near the water are markers for the start/end of beats. The beats are marked as red or blue for clarity between adjacent beats. Sometimes there are orange ones which have no controls.

ACT Fishing Regulation Compliance

Claude attended a meeting between various local fishing club Presidents and Danny Spelic, our new chief compliance officer. There has been much news on social media of increased compliance efforts – at this stage mainly educative rather than penalising. One very hot topic relates to the differences between NSW and ACT regulations in relation to the number of rods that can be in possession (by that I understand within 10 metres) which has got the kayak community a bit agitated. They feel that two rods are insufficient.

Please note that we were advised that they are in the process of further updating the Brochure which should be available soon.

CAA is Expanding our WhatsApp Presence

Members of the committee have noticed that use of WhatsApp for the Fly Tying Group and specific club events has received very positive feedback. We are going to trial a general club WhatsApp group to share member catches, provide a Q&A opportunity and general chat and notice board for activities such as upcoming club events. Claude (President) will be the Forum Moderator and has publicised the 'Group Rules' (below). This is an 'Opt In' group – please email President to register.

It is owned by Meta (Facebook) and provides quite a wide range of end-to-end encrypted messaging capabilities. The current CAA groups use only a small portion of its functions: for textual chatting and exchange of images/documents.

Canberra Anglers Association – WhatsApp Rules

1. Keep It Reel: This group is for all things fly fishing—casts, catches, tips, trips, gear talk, and the occasional fishy exaggeration. If it doesn't have fins, maybe don't post it.

2. Respect the Riverbank (and Each Other): Friendly banter is part of the game, but keep it respectful. No casting shade unless it's over a trout stream.

3. No Spot Spoilers: Fly fishing spots are sacred. Don't post GPS locations unless you're happy to share with the whole club (and half of Canberra).

4. Catch Pics Welcome (with Proof): We love seeing your catch! Just make sure the fish is real and not photoshopped from Google Images. Bonus points for artistic angles.

5. Trip Planning = Gold: Planning an outing? Post clear details (date, time, location, waders or no waders) and who's bringing the snacks.

6. No Politics, No Drama, Just Fish: We're here for the serenity, not the Senate. Keep debates about fly patterns, not parliament.

7. Keep it Clean: Language, content, and fishing gear. No offensive posts or fly/tackle boxbox tantrums.

8. Admins = Committee: They help keep things flowing smoother than a mountain stream. Respect their calls and give them fewer reasons to use the "remove" button.

9. Fly Fishing Advice Encouraged: Ask questions, share tips, show off your fly-tying skills whether you're a seasoned caster or just learning to untangle your first leader.

10. Stay Hooked: Be active, have fun, and remember—every cast is a fresh chance. Even if you catch nothing but weeds.

Antia Brademann, Facilitator for the Upper Murrumbidgee Demonstration Reach, and Michelle Janes, Senior Project and Programs Officer, South East Local Land Services, attended the conference. Antia presented on the rehabilitation work being done on the Upper Murrumbidgee between Tantangara Dam and the ACT border. You can see Antia's presentation at this link.

DPIRD

Luke Pearce, Senior Fisheries Manager Habitat Rehabilitation from the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development presented on the work he is doing to bring bluenose, AKA trout cod, back into our river systems. You can view a video about his work is on YouTube at this link.


I got from Peter material on the Stocky Galaxia – a somewhat recently identified critically endangered native becoming a greater interest in the context of Snowy Hydro 2.0.


