President's report

The past year has been another active and rewarding one for the Canberra Anglers Association, with members enjoying a wide variety of fishing trips, skills sessions, and community activities. Our outings ranged from local streams and dams to the coast, with highlights including the Mayfly Madness and Bondi events, the Merimbula salmon trip, and numerous freshwater expeditions across NSW and the Monaro. While conditions varied—from challenging weather to moments of exceptional success—each trip provided valuable opportunities for camaraderie, learning, and skill sharing.

Our fly-tying program remained a strong pillar of club life, covering patterns such as the Rusty Dun CDC variant and paraloop/hackle stacker techniques. Notable catches recorded in *The Burley Line* included trophy-sized Murray cod, brown and rainbow trout, redfin, and carp. This year, we saw an unusual drop in recorded catches. Despite it being a particularly tough local fishing season, I strongly encourage all members to continue submitting their catches to the records book, as it provides an important resource for the club and its members.

It is encouraging to see that we have another strong program ahead, thanks to our enthusiastic and committed event organisers. I would like to acknowledge and thank everyone who helped organise events over the past year, as well as those already supporting next year's program. Our flagship event remains the public fly-casting program organised by Lyall, which not only allows us to share our knowledge but also serves as a key way to attract new members. This year, we will introduce a dedicated introductory skills morning on moving water for new members, and I hope many of you will come along to support this initiative.

To improve communication, we have established WhatsApp groups for General Club Communications, Fly Tying, and specific club events.

We are grateful to our sponsors—Boss Outdoors, Capital Fly Casting, The Raiders (Weston), Tackleworld Canberra, and Red Baron—whose generous support provides benefits for our members. Trout Cod

During the Ordinary General Meeting following the Annual General Meeting, there was some discussion about recent initiatives by NSW Fisheries to reintroduce Trout Cod (also known as bluenose) into waters in our region. The Committee sought the insertion of the remarks below into this newsletter to clarify CAA's situation.

The Canberra Anglers Association (CAA) does not hold a formal position on the reintroduction of Trout Cod into traditional trout waterways. While some individual members have expressed support for these programs and have contributed to them in a personal capacity, they have done so as private individuals, not as representatives of the CAA. We encourage members to be proactive in causes they believe in. Likewise, we recognise that other members have expressed concerns about restocking programs, including the potential impacts on local trout populations and possible future restrictions on river access. The committee does not believe that any action could have been taken to prevent the reintroduction of Trout Cod, nor would it have sought to take such action.

More on Trout Cod

During the Ordinary General Meeting there was also a discussion on signage on the Goodradigee referring to trout cod. Concern was expressed that it might suggest that, as trout cod waters, recreational angling might be prohibited, or at least discouraged, especially if there were no trout signage. With assistance from an MAS member who lives up this way, the signage was identified. As far as I know, despite trout cod stocking occurring in the river over the past few years (noting last season only below the Brindabella Road bridge). Fisheries have not moved to ban trout stocking, nor remove it from having the status of trout waters. Seems to me that the signs are for anglers to take care not to hurt any trout cod that might be there (noting that none were found during surveys above the Brindabella Road bridge earlier this year). I had expected that any trout



cod signs would be accompanied by the trout waters signs showing size/catch regulations.

Since our August meeting, CAA has been invited, if it wishes, to make formal comments on the Draft NSW Trout Cod (Blue nose) Reintroduction Strategy – this is currently under Committee consideration.

Snowy Hydro 2.0 and Impact on Tantangara

Discussions were had at the AGM regarding the impact of Snowy Hydro 2.0 operation on fishing in Tantangara, including the future fluctuations in water levels. I received assistance from Snowy Hydro to prepare this summary of the situation.

The Snowy 2.0 Recreational Fishing Management Plan is primarily focused on the trout growout facility, which will be a valuable asset for future trout fishing sustainability. A separate Recreation Management Plan is in development which will address things like road access and facilities provided in and around the reservoirs.

During the August 2nd MAS workshop, Snowy Hydro indicated that future access arrangements for fishing would be included in this plan and that the fishing community will be consulted as it takes shape. This plan will detail the future condition of roads and access, provision for camping and recreational facilities, indicate the likely maritime exclusion area around the power station intake and the location of future boat ramp/s. Snowy Hydro has committed to consulting with the MAS during Plan preparation and ensuring that future access considers both shore based and boat-based fishing.

Snowy Hydro indicated that future water levels at Tantangara Reservoir will be, on average, higher and more variable than current levels. At any given time, levels will be influenced by inflows, environmental release requirements and electricity grid energy demand and supply.

The CAA, through the MAS, should continue to monitor the development of the Snowy 2.0 Recreational Plan.

Bombala Trip – 16-17 Aug

With the cancellation of the trip to Bondi Forest Lodge, a cunning plan was hatched to go and stay at Bombala and fish Black Lake. BJ honcho'd the idea, while Paul, Bill, Rod and Lyall participated with him.

No question that the fishing was hard with only Paul successful fishing from SS Trout Bum with BJ. One rainbow hen on the last cast of the day on Saturday, and a similar sized jack on the Sunday. A quick stop at Lake Williams on the way home proved fruitless. Nevertheless, a good social weekend with Mrs Bill (Glenys) coming along for the social aspects too.


"Fly Tying" 27 Aug

This was a session with a totally different flavour. Was an opportunity to share tips, recommended gear, Internet resources and more. Most importantly, a chance to finalise the fly tying program for the rest of this season (and actually beyond). Now published. We were all amazed at some of the setups – Claude's and Lachy's were sights to behold.

Carp Hybrids

Greg S didn't know he was opening a Pandora's Box when we sent me this Facebook link:

The caption was This is a carp F1 hybrid that I caught in the Murray River a few days ago. It's a European carp crossed with a crucian carp. You can tell that it's a little different by its shape. It's more of a perch shape, and it lacks the whiskers (barbles) of a European carp. Google "Carp F1 Hybrid" and read up on them, it's quite fascinating.

The suggestion to research F1 Hybrid took me into the world of cross breeding carp, but a later Facebook comment pointed out that Crucian Carp are quite rare in Australia and suggested this fish may be a carp/goldfish hybrid. The Atlas of Living Australia doesn't show anything for F1 https://bie.ala.org.au/search?q=F1+carp but does for carp crossed with goldfish https://bie.ala.org.au/species/ALA_DR24112_375. (Elsewhere called "Kollar Carp".) Goldfish are prolific https://bie.ala.org.au/species/https://biodiversity.org.au/afd/taxa/1bf24d7e-3b21-4aba-9ea1-df66908afcf4 but crucian carp have a very limited range https://bie.ala.org.au/species/ALA_DR24112_370 notably not found in the Murray. Sounds like the suggestion of goldfish crossed with carp would be much more likely.

Spin-off considerations are that most hybrids are sterile, but (I need to confirm my memory) mention was made that they are more robust than their parents – less susceptible to disease. I wonder if they would be immune to the carp herpes virus.



It is not the 'official record of catches' and so can include catches of interest that aren't eligible for trophies. Currently, the authoritative list for consideration for the <u>club trophies</u> is the little green book brought to meetings by the Secretary clearly marked as "Canberra Anglers Association Fish Register" pictured here. Please take photos of your catch with a tape or other verifiable measurement device (eg rod, but not your foot or hand).



We welcome emails advising how you are going, but don't forget to formally register them. Please be aware that I tend to collect catch information from word of mouth and articles submitted for publication. I occasionally peruse the little green book, but inclusion in *Burley Line* can't be interpreted as having been checked by me as being registered.
