## Goodradigbee Trip

### Ryan

It was a great trip to the Goodradigbee, the weather was absolutely stunning, beautiful warm days and a little cold in the morning. James and I fished above the 3rd ford the whole time as I hadn't been that far up before as wanted to explore. We caught plenty of small rainbows and a few larger 30cm+ fish, with my largest being 38cm. I even saw a platypus on Sunday morning!

Friday night saw a few bevies and lots of food, James is a whiz with his fireside cooking and had an abundance of food. Sat night was more tame, with Pete and Fran joining for a glass of wine and young Hector and his dad sharing their success of the day.

Fantastic trip as usual, I love that place. Encouraging to see so many juvenile fish too.

**From Hector** Thank you Ryan for a wonderful weekend. Hopefully you had some luck today. Me and dad caught eleven fish all together-dad had three and I got eight. Very few browns were caught. Maybe three? The blue ninja strikes again. Will be tying some very soon. I might add a couple of rubber legs. Could be good Maybe because it's coming to winter they are eating anything that looks even a tiny bit buggy. And the blue ninja was nice and bright so was easy to see.

**From Lachlan** A great trip. Thanks for organising it Ryan. A wonderful time had by all. The only other things I would add are:

- The Blue Ninja nymph turned out to be the fly of choice for the trip, with several of the team fishing it and having success. (See photos)
- If you are coming on a trip where James is catering, either bring a huge appetite or make sure others will pitch in to eat it. James caters to ensure he can feed everyone twice over! You won't go hungry.
- BJ used all three rods that he brought with him, including his Euro rod (see photo) which he used with a dry dropper setup which proved very effective.

- Although the water was very low and gin clear, there were certainly plenty of good fish around. Lachy's best fish, a 45cm rainbow, was caught in a boot depth riffle.
- This section of the Goodradigbee is recovering from the cormorant plague well. A few sections of the river were essentially nurseries full of young trout eager to gulp down size 20 Blue Ninjas. While most of these were rainbows (Pete advised they stocked them downstream last year), a few young browns were caught (see photos) which is very encouraging as these are naturally bred fish.

**From BJ** We weren't big on group photos this weekend. Mostly fireside banter. Gorgeous Autumn weather. Plenty of plump 15-20cm rainbows on small dries + smaller fish. both Lachy and Ryan scored a few bigger rainbows up to 45cm or maybe bigger for Ryan. I don't have those images.



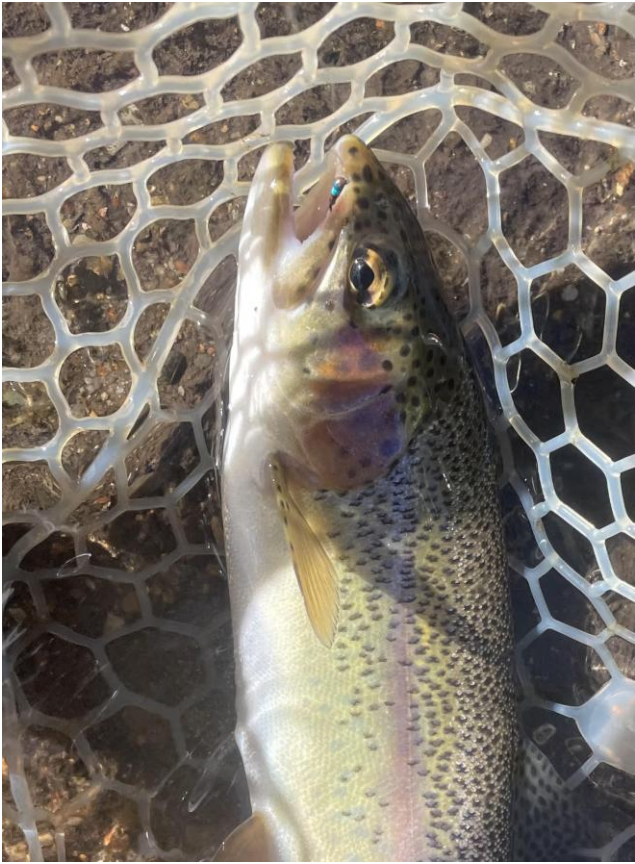

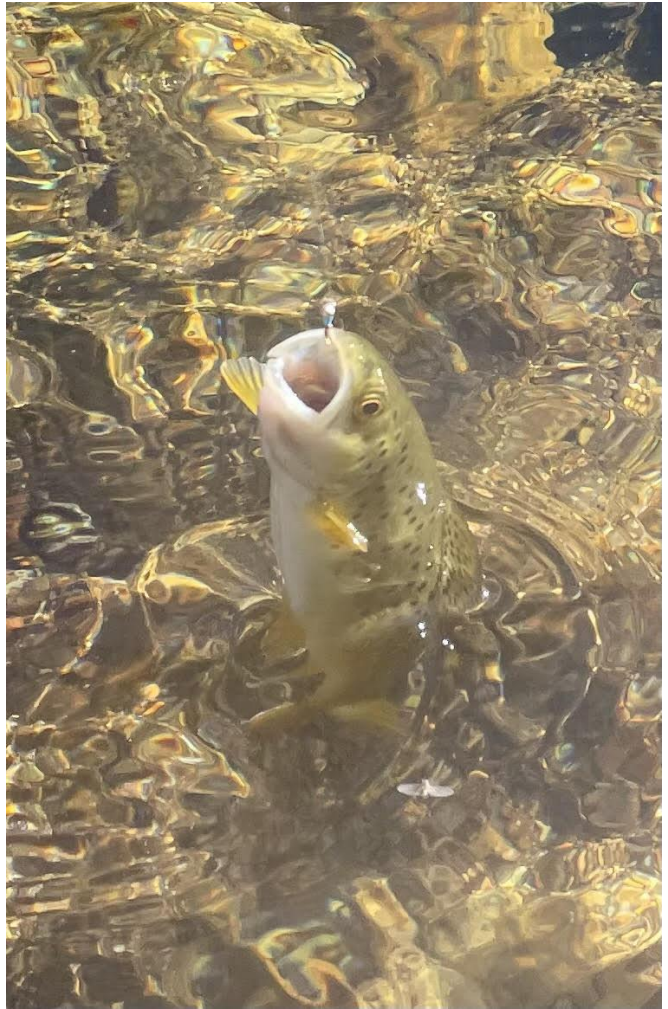

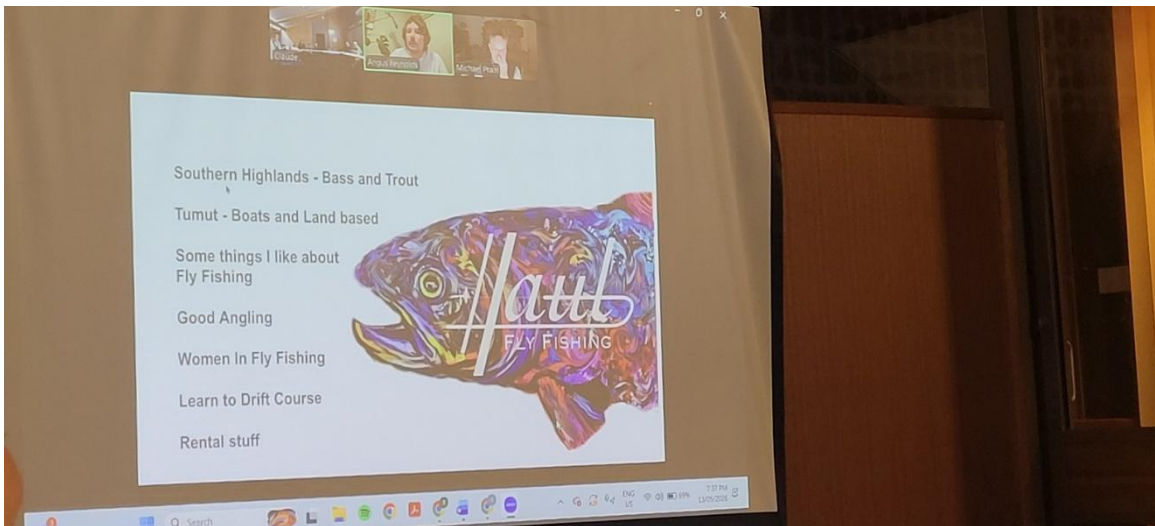


*One of BJ's 2 browns. Both from Lachie's Blue Ninja fly, but a smaller one also took the dry in the same gulp*

## Tumut Trip

While Xenii did all the hard work organising, she ended up being unavailable. We all appreciated her efforts and hope Xenii can make it next time.

22-24 May proved to have excellent weather for us. Cool mornings warming up in the plentiful sunshine. The river was very low so was great for wading, but did provide some challenges to those who brought rafts. While Personal Locator Beacons were not called upon, the presence of reasonable mobile coverage meant that our rafters, significantly slowed by the low current, were able to contact shorebased assistance and skilfully adjust their plan pausing their Saturday route at the caravan park. Both bank and raft fishing were tough with limited results – and the 'reliable' frantic rise in the pump pool near to the caravan park didn't eventuate as promised.

### Lachy (and the 3 Amigos)

We had a very comfortable trip from Canberra in Greg's new Prado, stopping for a late bite of lunch at Gundagai along the way. When we arrived at the caravan park, the light was already starting to get low on the horizon. So we ventured down to the pump house by the river at the back of the caravan park for the much anticipated evening rise... that didn't really eventuate.

Friday night saw a few others arrive as well as Claude and Greg B who had been on the water rafting. We managed to secure a table at the Tumut River Brewery to enjoy a tasty meal and a few of the local beers. We ended up having ringside seats to the local entertainment which was mainly tunes from the 70s.



Hearing that another fishing club (from Berrima and mates of Angus) was in the area, we decided to venture up to the Goobarragandra River, first near the start of the Hume and Hovell Walking Track, and then at the Rock Flat Campground. Neil was breaking out his newly repaired 11ft 3wt Primal Euro Nymph rod. He had made up a new leader the night before, only to realise he had left his tippet rings at home. His mates had him covered, but as luck would have it, his leader broke on the water. Thankfully Lachy was nearby and was able to help out with a new tippet ring.



This was actually a blessing in disguise as Lachy got back in the water and on his second cast, he hooked what became the fish of the day, a chunky 36cm rainbow. The new measuring device was put to the test and proved quite accurate. Thanks to Neil for the help taking photos in the net.



Lachy then asked Neil to get one more photo holding the fish, but Lachy had a repeat of his NZ experience with the fish doing explosive yoga movements and leaping from his grasp! And that was it! No more fish were caught. A few nibbles, but nothing more.

All was not lost however. At the second Goobarragandra site, while Neil and Lachy were working their way back to the car, Greg had a chat to a couple who had been at the first location and had set up their well appointed caravan at the Rock Flat campground. They were very kind Canberra locals who offered the three of us cuppas and we may have sung the club praises in the hope of recruiting yet another member.

We decided to head back to the caravan park for the evening rise, just in time to see Paul arrive and setting up camp. He decided to join in for the evening rise... which again did not eventuate. Mmmm, sad face!

For Sunday we decided to keep it close to base and fished the stretch of the Tumut River at the back of the Caravan Park. Greg was spinning, Neil on dries and Lachy on the obligatory euro nymph rig. Greg kept close to the pump house with no luck. Lachy and Neil crossed over the river and ventured further downstream before wading into the water amongst a collection of wide riffles and deeper run off pools. It wasn't long before Claude radioed to ask where we were. Only a few moments later Claude in his single raft and Greg B and Jeff in Greg's two-man raft, floated

on past. This turned out to be a good omen as Lachy soon hooked up on a sizeable fish in one of the deeper pools, only for the critter to spit the hook and get off. It was not a total loss as Lachy soon hooked a lovely tiddler of a rainbow, but alas that was the last fish netted for the day.

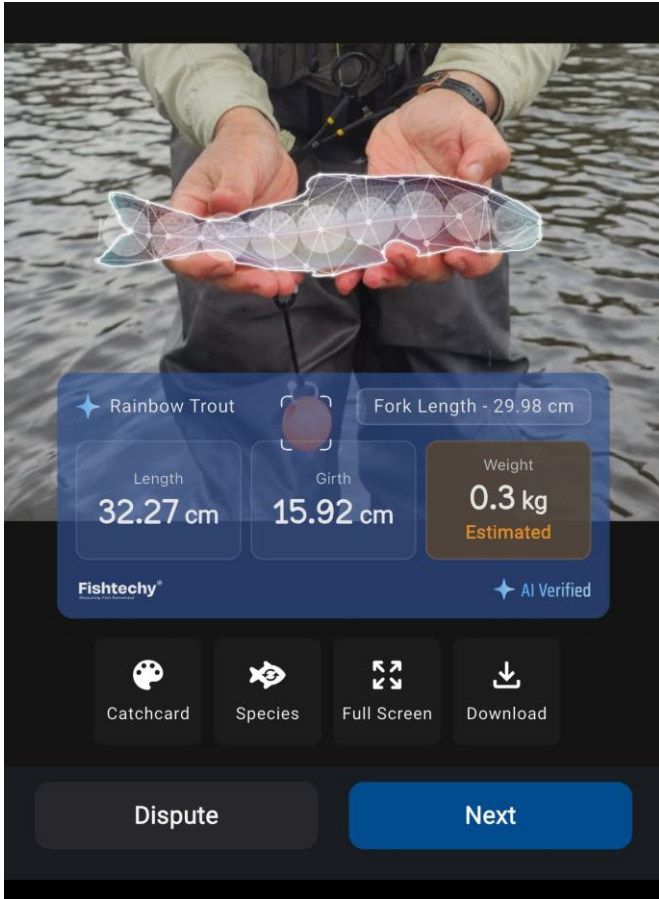

Finally got a fish on euro – about 30cm to be verified – and a couple of smaller ones.





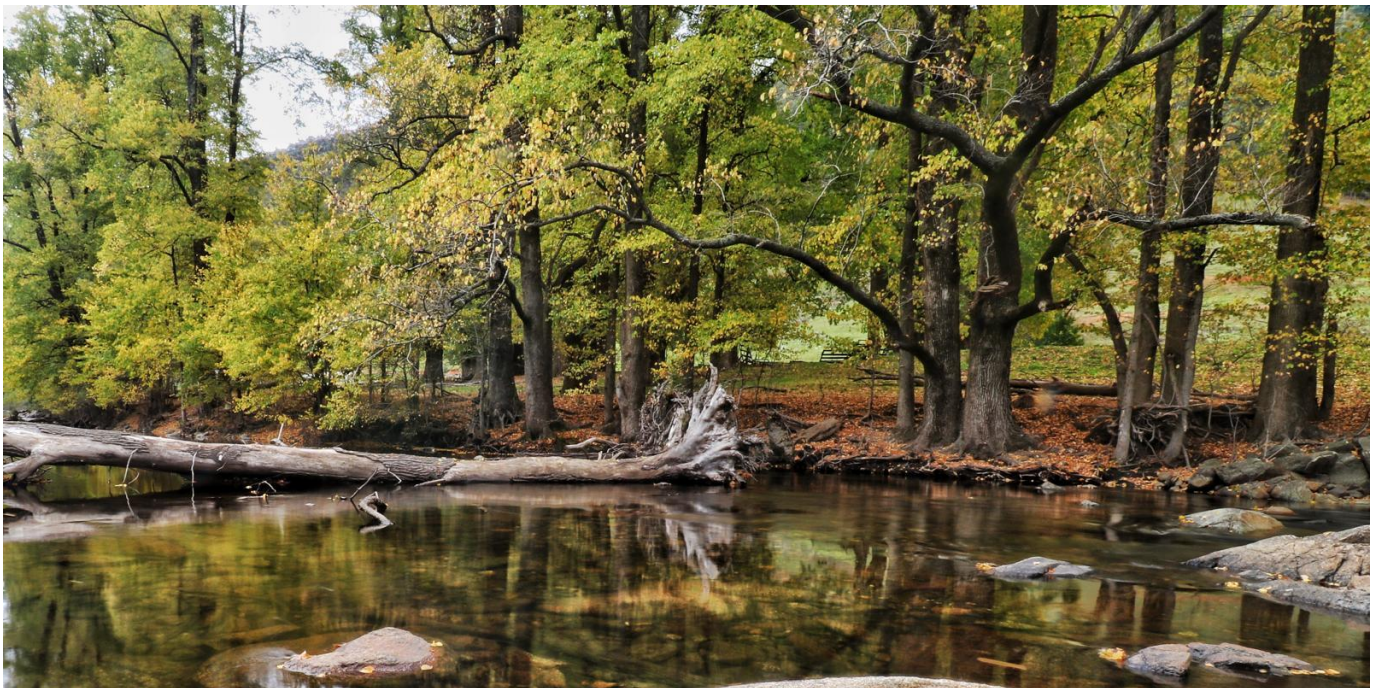
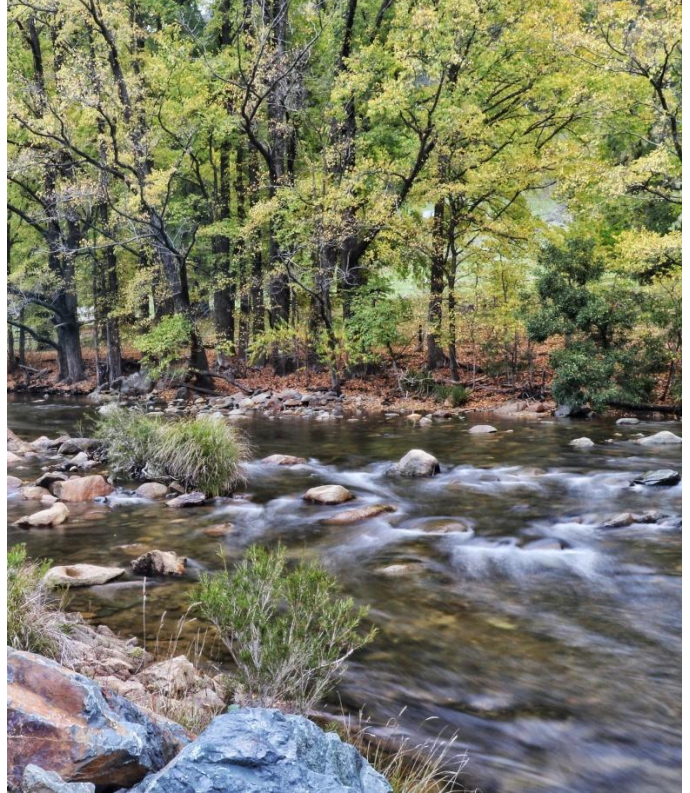

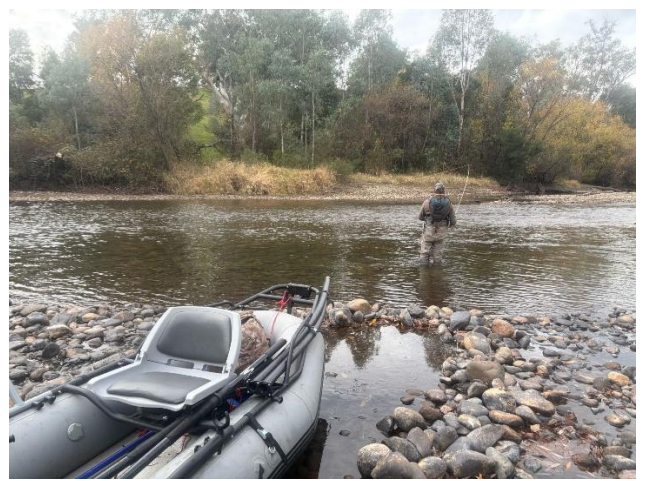

Roughly 25 kms by river but Claude will be able to confirm the detail as he was navigator and driving the sextant. The fish were light on. Absolutely fabulous trip for sightseeing. I landed 6 rainbows and dropped one over Friday and Saturday. Nil on Sunday. All fish were small in size.



## Bill

Friday night revealed no mass rise at the previously reliable pump pool. Downstream fish were popping up sporadically but all over the river. One 10cm job showed how ignorant it was by hooking up on a para Adams being retrieved for the next cast – a lecture was duly given. No more were managed and Tumut Brewery was sounding like a better idea.

Saturday was with Jeff on the upper reaches of Gilmore Creek – such pretty country was like an English countryside. Jeff was improving with every cast, though he reckons trees remain fly magnets. In one pool we spotted three very large browns slowly moving upstream. Jeff gave one a red-hot go but received no reward.



Come Sunday and travelled with Paul in the 'red bellied black' to a very upstream reach of the Goobarragandra. The neighbourhood was showing its displeasure by bike locks on every gate and lots of 'stay away signs'. In due course we found a property with people present and were pleasantly surprised by an offer to unlock a gate and permission to go in.

Paul showed me how it's done in riffly water in the pool just above me (while I was untying a knot!). Nice looking brownie, but too far away for me to get a photo ... don't worry, there'll be plenty more. Instead it turned out to be very quiet, but eventually Paul sighted some tussocks creating an undercut bank where he predicted there'd be a fish. Sure enough one poked its nose out but then completely missed hitting Paul's offering of a dun. To rub further salt into our wounds, it then proceeded to hit and miss my para Adams. Anyway enough and time to admire the autumn leaves, yack with a strange local and head back to Tumut. No significant photos taken but go to the Google Drive and check out the video – I felt lucky to get the drone back when I flew it out of comms range.

Glenys and I stayed the Sunday night – me thinking to have the big rise to myself. There was a deal more activity, but the steep banks deterred me (what would I do if I caught one?). In the flat water downstream just above the riffles there were constant rises on both edges – another time maybe. Glenys reckons the banks are no steeper or rockier, it is just that I'm several years older ... I'm not so sure, the outside bends have much more rocky protection than in years past. Help me here guys!

# Latest on the Review Into Management of Snowies Rivers

Many people, including our own member Guy, are putting a huge effort into this review of “Snowy Water Inquiry Outcomes Implementation Deed (SWIOID)” – what a mouthful. The background and ongoing updates are here

## The Forgotten River

**What 136 people said that the government didn't want to hear**

### Hi friends,

We hope you have been keeping well.

We wanted to reach out with a proper update because you may have noticed things have been a little quiet from us lately.

Much of what we do has always been unfunded, and the current environment is as difficult as we've seen it. That's meant pulling back from some of the day to day activity, even as the policy decisions shaping this river's future keep moving.

But we are still here, we are still paying attention, and we are committed to restoring this river.

# Eight truths emerging from 136 community submissions

When we ran two impromptu webinars earlier this year, we did not know what to expect. Nearly 450 people showed up. Then came 136 public submissions to the Snowy Water Inquiry Independent Review, with 82% identifying river health as the primary concern. An insider told us they had never seen numbers like that for a consultation at this scale.

We have been through every submission, and what emerges from them is worth your time. We have written up eight truths that keep surfacing across the community voice, from governance and accountability to the false choice being drawn between healthy rivers and renewable energy.

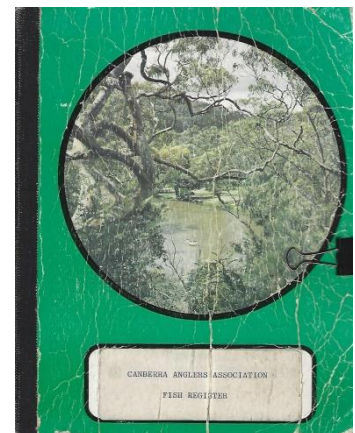
